Letter from the Rabbi

Chanukah – What Is Our Rededication About?

We retell the Chanukah story most years. It seems simple: "Evil Assyrians", "Good Maccabees", "Miraculous Oil", "Latkes! Jelly Donuts!"

The historical battle between the Hellenizing Assyrians of Antiochus was more of a civil war. Antiochus was an Assyrian tyrant, and his followers erected a statue of Zeus in the Temple in Jerusalem, held Greek-style contests in Jerusalem, prohibited circumcision and did other terrible things.

Still, it was Israel's elite, urban and cosmopolitan Jews who invited the Assyrians in as allies. The Maccabees from the hill country were dedicated to the old ways, fighting against the assimilationists who had adopted too many Greek customs.

The Hasmoneans, the dynasty that the Maccabees founded, became corrupt. In the First Century BCE, they invited the Romans in and became a vassal state. This led to civil war, the destruction of the Second Temple, and centuries of Roman oppression.

The early rabbis, from around 150 CE forward, disliked the legacy of the Hasmoneans and so preserved very little about them. The Maccabees' story comes to us from books that were preserved by Christians in the Apocrypha.

A short discussion about how to light the menorah so that we "publicize the miracle" is what we get from Jewish sources. This includes the famous argument between Hillel and Shammai about the order in which we light the candles. We follow Hillel's model, increasing the light on every night of the festival.

Our ancient rabbis sent us a message. Abandon the extreme argument between old ways and assimilation. Embrace the accepting path of Hillel – who would convert people to Judaism on the spot. Welcoming the stranger, pluralistic learning and discussion – these are the paths that the rabbis of the Talmud and later sources emphasize.

Let us follow their model this season. Chanukah means "dedication." In honor of the dedication of our ancestors to preserve a holiday even when they disliked it, let us try to preserve relationships that challenge us. Let us reach out to those with whom we disagree.

Let the light of Chanukah be one that brings us together and helps us appreciate our differences.

December Happenings

Consecration 2017/5778: Each year we welcome our students in Kindergarten – 3rd grade who are beginning their religious studies at Temple Beth Zion. The ceremony used in Reform congregations to mark the beginning of formal Jewish education is called Consecration. This year Consecration takes place on Sunday, December 17 in a special Tefillah service during Religious School, where the 7th graders, our oldest students, will welcome our newest students. At the Consecration service, the students will sing a number of prayers and songs, and will be called to the bimah for a special blessing by the clergy. In addition, they will be given a small replica of a Torah to symbolize the start of their own study of Torah.

Tzedakah of the Month for November 2017: In November we began a new schoolwide initiative called Tzedakah of the Month, and each grade participates in doing mitzvot. We put together Ziploc bags full of items to help someone in need. This is a very real, tangible way to help in a situation where you find someone who is in need, and you really feel like you want to do something but are unsure of exactly what to do. Handing out a Blessing Bag to someone gives you a way to meet their immediate needs by providing them with some basic supplies such as toiletries, water, food and warmth.

Blessing Bags are great to keep on hand in your car, so if you are in a situation where you find someone in need, you have the bag right there to hand to them on the spot. This is a way to demonstrate to your kids the act of giving in the face of a need instead of just driving by or walking away without responding.



Tzedakah of the Month December 2017: In December we will be collecting toys to donate for Chanukah. The Fifth Night event (actually will be the fourth night) is a fun and simple way for children to participate in Tzedakah by giving one night of Chanukah gifts to children in need instead of getting a gift themselves. We are going to continue the tradition of all donated gifts going to the refugee children in need through Jewish Family Service. Have your child pick out a gift that he or she would want for him or herself. Then your child can bring the gift (unwrapped) to services on Friday, December 15. For families not able to attend services, but still wanting to participate, gifts will be accepted at both buildings throughout the week of Chanukah.






