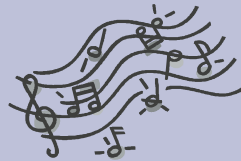

Letter from the President

What's New?

Reflections on what the secular new year will bring us are usually not quite as "deep" as those at Rosh Hashanah but I think that there are some "new" things that are worth thinking about. First of all, a hearty **Happy New Year** to everyone. As Jews we get to say that phrase more often than most others and maybe a second opportunity to refresh and move forward.

As of this writing, our **100 new members initiative** has been a success! In 2012, TBZ's board set an ambitious objective of signing on 100 new member units (households) over a two-year period. Given the consistent declines in TBZ membership over the past decades, and in particular the decreasing number of new members, it became clear to your board that one of its major priorities had to be attracting individuals to join our TBZ community. We are already at 103 new member households! **To all of our new members I say welcome.** To our whole congregation I say let's celebrate! **Friday, January 17**, is our **New Member Shabbat** and our celebration of Tu B'Shevat, a third "new" for us. This is more than symbolic. We invite our new members from 2012 and 2013, as well as those members who gave gift memberships this year, to join us in prayer and festivity. At this service our congregation will be greeting you and welcoming our new members into our bigger family. In honor of our new members I am encouraging all TBZ members to buy trees in Israel by **making a Tu B'Shevat contribution to the Jewish National Fund** (www.jnf.org).

The Torah says "You shall not oppress a stranger, for you know the feelings of the stranger, having yourselves been strangers in the land of Egypt (*Exodus 23:9*). I say that we have to go farther than that. We need to welcome the stranger. Next time you are at services or a TBZ function, think about how welcoming we truly are to those that are new and/or different from us. Please introduce yourselves and find out something new about someone who was previously a stranger to you. When we are all doing that we will truly become a community of worship, learning, and service - a "house of prayer for all people."

Speaking of new, and members, we have adopted a congregational policy for utilizing the information that we gather from you in the membership process. You may remember that I introduced this issue last year when we had several requests for use of our congregational database. More on this can be found in this issue of the *Bulletin*. Suffice to say that we have put new safeguards and processes in place to ensure your privacy.

One last "new" item. You will soon be able to check out our **new website at www.tbz.org**. Thank you especially to Deny Adelman and to Julie Feldman for their hard work in achieving this important objective.

Letter from the Cantor

This Is Only the Beginning

The title of this article is a mantra that I tell our B'nei Mitzvah students once they near completion of our B'nei Mitzvah program and prepare for the next chapter of their lives assuming all the responsibilities and privileges as a newly minted Jewish adult. As you know, I have recently completed my Hazzan/Cantor credential through the Cantors Assembly, which was a literal blood sweat and tears journey for not only myself, but for my family.

Back in October, Temple Beth Zion, along with my dear friend and mentor Cantor Beny Maissner, installed me as Cantor at Temple Beth Zion to a packed Sanctuary that rivaled any of our High Holy Day services. I was completely mystified at the sheer number of people who came that evening in support and to share in this incredible achievement.

I struggled for weeks wondering what I would say when it was my chance to address our congregation at that occasion, a moment I had dreamt about for years, but I struggled. Truthfully, I had no remarks written down and spoke from the heart in that moment because I knew that no matter what I had prepared, it wouldn't do the moment justice.

I delivered my remarks of gratitude but wanted to point out the most beautiful fact that hadn't been addressed at all during this incredibly personal and professional journey.

I spoke of trust. What a testament of character for a congregation to employ and charge a non-credentialed professional, such as I was in 2006, to be part of a clergy team that serves the largest, most dynamic and incredible synagogue in Western New York. While you were celebrating me and my accomplishment, it was just as important to celebrate the congregation who took a chance in hiring me.

What I find so moving in my work is how many lives I've come in contact with, and while I may have influenced your lives Jewishly, the impact that each and every one of you has made on my life is without measure. I have celebrated your simchas with you and have been there to help you in your moments of need. I am completely humbled by the love and support this community has shown my family and me since joining the TBZ family in 2006.

The moment I found out I had successfully passed my last exam back in May I responded to the Mazel Tovs with a simple thank-you and with the notion that now that I have completed my program, the real work is yet to begin.

It is a pleasure, privilege and sincere honor to serve Temple Beth Zion as your Cantor, and I look forward to a continued fruitful partnership for, G-d willing, many more years to come.

Policy on Privacy of Congregants' Information and Sharing of Membership Mailing List

TBZ is committed to protecting the privacy of its members' personal information entrusted to TBZ. To that end, when TBZ receives requests from outside organizations or individuals to share its member information, it has been TBZ's practice to decline such requests, except in certain limited circumstances. For example, TBZ annually provides member names and addresses to our umbrella organization, the Union for Reform Judaism, allowing our members to receive Reform Judaism magazine, and to the Jewish Federation of Greater Buffalo, so that Federation may identify unaffiliated Jewish households in the community and so that our members may receive the Jewish Journal.

In light of TBZ's commitment to safeguarding the privacy of its members' personal information, the Board of Trustees determined to adopt a uniform policy. Through yeoman work by Howard Rosenhoch, with input from Susan Bring Tobe and Amy Schaefer, the following formal policy was written, and the Board adopted the **"Policy on Privacy of Congregants' Information and Sharing of Membership Mailing List,"** which can be found in full on our website, www.tbz.org. Those without web access can call Julie Feldman at 836-6565 to receive a printed copy.

1. It is the policy of TBZ to protect the privacy of the personal information entrusted to TBZ by its members.
2. Unless compelled by law, TBZ will not provide any TBZ member's personal financial information.
3. Except in limited circumstances, TBZ will decline requests for all personal information of TBZ members.
4. All requests for TBZ members' contact information will be evaluated based on the following factors:
 - a. The type of information requested must be well defined;
 - b. The proposed use must be appropriately limited;
 - c. The purpose or purposes for which the information is proposed to be used must be seen as beneficial to TBZ and/or the community as a whole;
 - d. The purpose or purposes for which the information is proposed to be used must be seen as not detrimental to TBZ's members;
 - e. The requestor must give assurance that the information will not be used for improper or commercial purposes, or for any purpose beyond the use authorized;
 - f. The requestor must give assurance that all copies of the information will be returned to TBZ or destroyed once the authorized limited use is concluded.
5. TBZ will not disclose any TBZ member's telephone numbers or e-mail addresses without first notifying the member of the request for such information, and affording the member the opportunity to decline such request or opt out.
6. All requests for personal information of TBZ members must be made to TBZ's Executive Director.
7. No request for personal information will be provided without the unanimous consent of TBZ's Executive Director, Senior Rabbi and President.

Family Education 2013-2014

Zerizut – Just Do It – With Enthusiasm!

This year our Family Education program is focused on doing mitzvot **WITHOUT** hesitation and **WITH** enthusiasm, adding to the understanding that Mitzvot are commandments from G-d and that they can make a difference in the world.



We began the year discussing the importance of Equal Education for all with our 7th grade class. We discussed meeting the specific needs of all individuals from the very young and throughout their school years. We learned about different types of educational environments and how they can assist in meeting the needs of different learning styles. We learned what we can do to be supportive of different educational needs and to speak up and advocate for education for all.

Our Kindergarten class, along with the other consecration students, prepared for their Consecration by learning about Tzedakah and the importance to help others in need. As this group of young students began their formal Jewish Education, they learned how important their giving of weekly Tzedakah is to help others.

Our 3rd grade families spent their Family Day talking about loneliness, in particular among the elderly population. Gail Siskin, Director of Wellness at Canterbury Woods, spoke to the group about the aging process and how older people may need to adjust to new living environments. By doing activities to simulate how aging affects both vision and dexterity, the students were encouraged to remember that although the physical body may be changing, the person is still the same person and wants to be treated the same as they always have been.

We are looking forward to the next Family Education programs and bringing opportunities to our families to practice "zerizut" in the community!

Ready, Set, Grow at PALS!

PALS students are mensches and scholars. We study Torah together weekly and practice incorporating our Jewish values into our daily life. We learn together how to be responsible for words and actions as well as our belongings. The ability to realize the impact of our words and to recognize social cues is truly a lifelong lesson, one that your child will learn at PALS.



PALS students are scientists and ecologists. This fall we studied the beautiful colors and learned about the changes in the trees that we saw. Students experimented with corn by taking apart stalks and using each element for different types of activities. Encouraging curiosity and appreciation of our environment are gifts we encourage and foster at PALS.

PALS students are farmers and community explorers. After an exciting and adventure-packed trip to a pumpkin farm, the Zekitot (3 year olds) and Tziporim (4 year olds), returned to school and put all of their new-found knowledge to play by growing their own pumpkins! The children watered their crops and monitored the growth of their vines. The vines were transplanted to an outdoor bed before the snow arrived so that we can keep this terrific project "growing" all year long. Children learn through hands-on age-appropriate interactions with their world and their community at PALS.

PALS students are architects and historians. The PALS children built a Sukkah together. Every class had a developmentally appropriate (and very important) role in the construction. At the end of the project, each group was able to enjoy the "fruits of their labor" by enjoying a snack in the sukkah. The students also learned about the Mayflower by building their own "ship" on the playground. The children loved using their "telescopes" and spotting Plymouth Rock for the first time. The ability to personalize information and make it "one's own" is valued at PALS.

PALS students are party planners and chefs. The classes planned their own Thanksgiving feast for loved ones. They made invitations, centerpieces and even planned the entertainment. They also made delicious latkes and Chanukah cookies. Welcoming families in to our PALS community is what we are all about.

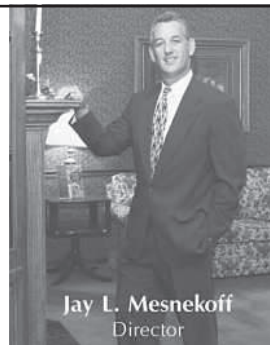
