Letter from the President

Vote for the Soul of the State of Israel

Union for Reform Judaism has asked Temple leaders to encourage congregants to vote in the upcoming World Zionist Congress. The vote occurs every four years and will run from January 15 through April 30, 2015.

I personally had never paid much attention to this in the past; but doing my diligence as an elected leader, I read the recent plea and thought I should share this with you.

Consider: There is a bill in the Knesset that threatens the fabric of Israeli democracy.

Consider: Reform rabbis are free to perform marriage rites for Jews anywhere in the world — except Israel.

So who is who?

ARZA, Association of Reform Zionists of America, serves 1.5 million Reform Jews in North America. It is a vehicle for the collective participation of Reform Jews in Israel. It puts emphasis on advocacy, travel and Zionist education in America. ARZA represents Reform Jews in the World Zionist Congress, providing a strong voice for Reform Jews in America and Israel.

World Zionist Organization (WZO) was founded by Theodor Herzl at the First Zionist Congress in Basel in 1897. Today it chooses representatives for the Jewish Agency for Israel, the Jewish National Fund, and other affiliates. WZO utilizes the World Zionist Congress to establish its policies and elect leadership to the bodies that define executive policy, departmental direction, and budget decisions.

World Zionist Congress is WZO's supreme institution and legislative body. The Congress meets every four years in Jerusalem. It is the ONLY body in which all of World Jewry is represented democratically. It makes decisions that affect the status of Reform Jews in Israel and across the world and the funding available to Progressive Jews in Israel.

Voting is the single most effective way for the Reform Movement to influence policy in Israel. Our Reform Movement seeks a democratic Israel, which represents and supports <u>ALL</u> expressions of Judaism, which respects women's rights and which strives to obtain a peaceful resolution to the Palestinian issue.

Letter from the Cantor

Take the Path of Interaction

"Listen to my music and see what it can do. There's something here that's as strong as life, I know that it will reach you"

From song 2112 from Canadian progressive rock band Rush.

We sit at an intersection of two roads. One path is meaningful interactions, and the other path is complete alienation. As technology continues to evolve and become seamlessly woven into every moment of our lives, we must be ever so vigilant to have living, breathing moments in real time, in real life and not through the camera lens. I speak specifically to the next generation of Jews and those who will follow, all of whom are growing up in a digital age.

Ironically, technology has become ever-present so that everything we need and want is instantaneous at the touch of a screen. In theory, one needs not to actually step foot into a synagogue to participate or observe Shabbat services, but yet the irony is that while we are able to become more accessible to one another, the human experience in "real time" between one another vis a vis through a handshake, hug, or face to face human interaction is becoming as obsolete as the "brick" cell phone.

It is daunting for adults who are juggling schedules, errands, households and making time to come to TBZ for services. Furthermore, how can we expect to "connect" with one another in a language which most of us aren't fluent, prayers most don't understand, and music we might not be familiar with?

I often struggle with how to balance the traditions we have inherited as a people and customs of TBZ while being mindful of the reality of the world today. How can we solicit interest in our children and provide them with a Jewish experience that is authentic to Judaism and (possibly) more importantly, relevant to the kids who are growing up in a culture where the synagogue is no longer the central part of their lives?

This year's celebration of Shabbat Shira will, G-d willing, provide all of us with answers to these questions.

In order to celebrate the promise in all of us, we'll acknowledge the present by using some popular top 40 songs of today and adapt the melodies to our prayers. We call it **Sha-Pop Shira**.

This service will use music from Pitbull, Iggy Azalea, Daft Punk, plus preserving melodies that are beloved to TBZ all the while merging the customs of our people.

Please join us on **Friday**, **January 30**, **at 7 p.m.** in our Delaware building as we celebrate Shabbat. Regardless of advances in this technological world we live in, nothing is as strong as a life or more meaningful than being together breathing the same air, hearing each other's voices, and being part of something larger than social media. At TBZ, there's something here that's as strong as life, and I know that <u>we</u> will reach you.

Israel Update by Aaron Pieri

In the May issue of the Bulletin, we congratulated lifelong TBZ member Aaron Pieri and wished him well as he headed off to Jerusalem to began his course of study at the Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion as a rabbinical student! We have invited Aaron to share his experiences with all of us, and we are delighted that he has accepted:



There is a Yiddush saying that I learned from one of my professors here in Jerusalem. It says, "A shlekhter sholem iz bezer vi a gutter krig" (A bad peace is better than a good war). Spending these past six months in Jerusalem, I've realized this to be the ultimate Israeli truth.

My time in Israel so far has been a turbulent one to say the least. Two days into the summer semester, Gaza started firing rockets into Israel. No more than a week later, the Israel Defense Forces initiated Operation Protective Edge, eliminating not only many rockets from Gaza, but eliminating the tunnels terrorists had built in order to attack Jews in Israeli cities. During student orientation, the sirens went off, and I had 15 seconds to get to a bomb shelter. It made me realize that I had never been in a situation in my life before where violence on such a large scale could break out at the drop of a hat. It made the times where there was a cease-fire moments of hope, even if they were only few and far between.

Despite all of this, however, my friends/classmates and I have learned a valuable Hebrew expression to help us move on from the violence. It's "Lizrom (LEEZ-rom)," which means, "to roll with the punches." The beauty of Israel is that even though they could be going through a tough time such as war and violence, they are still able to go about their lives as if nothing had ever happened.

All the prayers that I grew up with at Kabbalat services (Shalom Rav, Oseh Shalom, Mi Sheberach) have taken on more profound meaning than they have had in the past. I'll admit that when I used to pray for these things in the States, I would limit the scope to only the people I know and the situations I am familiar with.

This is not unheard of in our liturgy. The Amidah, the central part of our prayer service, is divided into three parts, the second of which is the Petition stage, where we ask G-d for many different things. I urge you the next time you pray to broaden the scope of what you are praying for. Pray not only for yourself, your family, your friends, or the Jewish community you live in, but pray for the world. Pray for the world so that we may be closer to worldwide "refuah shleimah," a complete healing of the soul of the world. Maybe, if we can do this, one day we might be able to not only have a "bad peace," but a good one.

With the words I have left, I just want everybody to know that I am doing great! I love all of my classes and have bonded with all of my classmates I can now call friends. I want to thank everybody for all of the well-wishes and prayers you have sent my way, and I can't wait to see you all again when I return to Buffalo toward the end of May.

Photographs Needed

Archival photographs are needed for the Temple Beth Zion archives and the Jewish Buffalo Archives Project! Do you have early internal photographs from 599 Delaware Avenue, which tragically burned in 1961? A researcher is interested in the Tiffany windows that were part of this wonderful building designed by Edward Kent.

Currently, the only surviving photographs that exist of these ornamental memorial windows are in a 1957 Ph.D. Dissertation by Robert Koch, and unfortunately they are not of good quality. These windows were endowed by five families, and each window was created in memory of family members.

These memorial windows were in the names of: Marcus, Bergman, Geiershofer, Altman and Warner. Although we have a handful of photographs inside the sanctuary, they are taken looking toward the bimah (which would be the usual aspect). However, what we need are photographs taken from the bimah looking out to the windows or simply images of the windows themselves. There were also other windows, including a large decorative window. Can you help us document this beautiful building? Perhaps you have other photographs of the Temple rooms too? 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
