Yom HaShoah Commemoration: 'We Remember'


Sunday, May 1, 1 p.m. 805 Delaware Avenue

Letter from the President

Dear Friends,

A part of the Task Force on Staffing model that hasn't been discussed is the creation of a President's Advisory Committee. The concept was recommended by the Task Force to give historical perspective and guidance to incoming leadership. I am pleased to announce that Past President Orrin Tobbe has agreed to chair this important effort. In addition to his leadership at Temple Beth Zion, Orrin has served on the Union for Reform Judaism Board for 10 years and served as URJ Regional President. I do not believe there is anyone better equipped to advise our current and incoming President; and I thank Orrin for taking this on.

One project I had hoped to work on during my presidency was to lead an in-depth discussion of the many designated funds the Board or families have set up to remember or honor loved ones who had passions for particular aspects of Temple Beth Zion's

Each month, in this publication, donations are listed and usually one fund is highlighted detailing what it is set up to assist. Last month the focus was on the Corinne F. and Michael F. Ellis Landscaping Fund. This fund provides resources for special landscaping projects at both of our buildings.

I'd like to call your attention to two particular funds. Our Caring Community Fund is seriously underfunded and could use your contributions. This fund helps the Caring Community Committee in numerous ways. At Purim, the committee delivered 175 Shalach manot bags. They bring wine and challah to grieving families, help out at the Food Pantry, bring meals to people who are sick or recently home from the hospital. The list goes on and on. Money and volunteers are ALWAYS needed. I want to thank Leslie Garfinkel, who is the Chair and tireless leader of the committee - and to congratulate her on being this year's Sisterhood Woman of the Year.

Another, lesser known fund is the Torah Restoration Fund. Rabbi Pokras had all of our sacred Torahs evaluated by a Master Sofer a few years ago. The total dollar amount to restore all the scrolls to "kosher" was substantial. Rabbi Pokras started a group of "Holy Rollers" - congregants who were willing to spend some time doing the work that can be done by lay volunteers. We have resurrected that group and will begin working on Torahs again this spring. We need donations (for supplies and for the work that we must engage the Sofer to do). I joined this effort and found enormous satisfaction in having a small part in this holy work.

Letter from the Cantor

Delivering a Message

A priest, a rabbi and Donald Trump walk into a Convention Center...and nobody walks out!

Something very strange happened at the AIPAC conference in Washington, D.C., in March. News of the presidential party ticket hopefuls addressing nearly 19,000 supporters of Israel spread faster than wildfire through a California drought. It was certainly a sight and spectacle to behold. The protesters and haters were assembled en masse outside with their signs painted with a similar theme: don't support Trump by being present to listen to his first political address on foreign policy.

Weeks before the policy conference, rumors of staging a walkout in demonstration against Trump flared up and were cause for great debate. People on all sides of the political spectrum were up in arms about the dogmatic Trump and the way he has handled himself over the past months. It seemed that regardless of our differences there was a universal opinion for this businessman who lacks the polished, diplomatic skills with which we have become accustomed as a person considering a run for President to have.

When the time came for him to address us, what I had hoped for actually occurred. There was no walkout, there was no staged demonstration, save for the folks who didn't have tickets and were picketing outside. Instead, the tens of thousands of us politely listened to the remarks of all the speakers, even Trump.

In the moments leading up to waiting in security checkpoints I realized that regardless of past declarations of bigotry and sexism towards "others," if we were to stage a walkout, then we would be no better than him. Turning a blind eye to bigotry and intolerance by walking out on Trump would only reflect the same sentiments he spews out via his rhetoric. Furthermore, if there was a walkout and Trump becomes the next President of the United States, will the same volatile Trump pull all support for Israel because of a walkout? I worried as I waited.

But that is when I realized that sitting politely while looking in the face of intolerance as we did with Trump was the most powerful way for us to send our message btzelem elokim we are all made in G-d's image, yes...even Donald Trump. And there is no room for 19,000 supporters of Israel to be behaving badly, one bully is enough for the world.

'March Through the Arts'

Our theme for March, "March Through the Arts," was an amazing hit with the entire PALS community. The first artist we studied was Wassily Kandinsky.

From his abstract art, we learned about the mathematical term of concentric circles. From Matisse's cut-out picture, "The Snail," we cut out and pasted squares and rectangles in many different sizes and colors.

During our Picasso period, we studied the drawing of Don Quixote, and the children "copied" what they saw. Developmentally, to transfer what children see with their eyes to their own paper would be a higher-level skill. We were quite impressed, as were the children, with their ability.

Using a variety of utensils, other than brushes, we re-created van Gogh's masterpiece "Starry Night." Next was one of our favorite artists, Jackson Pollock. We copied his technique in our classroom by splashing paint on large sheets of paper taped to the floor. The results were amazing.

Religious School

Artful Sundays

In addition to advising our TBaZY youth groups, Nancy Spector has had the great honor this year of introducing our kindergarten through seventh-graders to the inspiring creativity of Jewish artists of the $20^{\rm th}$ century during Sunday Religious School art classes.

Kindergarteners and first-graders learned about the large, abstract color paintings of Mark Rothko and tried their own hand at creating his fields of soft, glowing color with pastels and oil pastels.

Second-graders learned that Lee Krasner is famous for cutting up her paintings and rearranging them into beautiful abstract collages, and then made their own creations using her technique.

Third-graders studied the entrancing portraits of Amedeo Modigliani and created portraits of their classmates in his painting style.

Fourth-graders experimented with Israeli artist Yaacov Agam's method of combining two paintings onto a "folded" three-dimensional surface, creating a work of art that hangs on a wall but that you must move around to experience fully.

Fifth-graders learned about Marc Chagall's beautiful paintings, many of them celebrating Jewish life in his shtetl in Russia at the turn of the century. They created their own memory scenes in his style. (See photo on left below)

Sixth-graders studied how Pop artist Roy Lichtenstein adopted the subject matter of the "pop"ular culture of our times, from comic books to washing machines, creating paintings using a technique called Benday dots to blend his colors. This method was the technology for mass-printing images before the digital age. Students experimented with making their own images of objects or characters from today's popular culture to create a dialog.

And finally, seventh-graders learned about Sol LeWitt's invention of conceptual art, where the idea is more important than the final artwork. Each student created rules for other students to generate an image and talked about the all-important question this raises: "What is art?" (See photo on right below) This question, like many important questions Jews grapple with, doesn't come with an easy answer.

Thank you, Nancy, for inspiring our students to use the visual arts to express their Jewish identity.




