Letter from the President

The good people at Wegmans are always the first to alert me that Passover is coming soon. Every year, I slowly circle the large display of matzoh, gefilte fish, brownie mix, and festive paper products. I like to see what new Passover delicacies Manischewitz has come up with for us to try. There are always a few people perusing the impressive display with me. I love schmoozing with them and asking what their plans are for the holiday.

Members of our TBZ family will celebrate the first night of Passover together at the Marriott Hotel. I hope you got your reservation in and that I'll see you there! Our clergy team, the Ritual Committee, our Community Seder Chair, Kaarsten Wisnock and our wonderful staff have worked very hard to put together a beautiful Seder for us.

TBZ will participate in "2 For Seder" again this year. Marnie Fineberg started "2 for Seder" in memory of her mother-in-law who was killed celebrating Shabbat at the Tree of Life Synagogue last October in Pittsburgh. The shooter was outraged that synagogues all over America were honoring the important work of HIAS (Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society) and chose to demonstrate that outrage by murdering innocent Jewish souls.

The overarching goal of "2 For Seder" is to combat hate, misunderstanding and bias by inviting members of other faiths to a Seder, helping to make the unfamiliar into something known. My husband and I happily hosted two people at last year's Community Seder and are planning to do so again this year.

In "Our Obligation to Remember the Stranger and the Immigrant on Passover," Barry Shrage reminds us that, "Passover, more than any other holiday on the Jewish calendar, requires us to empathize with the stranger in our midst.....We can never again forget what is like to be a stranger in a strange land. We join together at the Seder to remember slavery in Egypt (Mitzrayim) and are asked to recall what it was like to be a people traveling alone, with no one to come to our aid..."

In "Liberating Ourselves from Narrowness", Lesli Koppelman Ross reminds us that, "each of us live in our own Mitzrayim, the external or physical narrow straits of financial or health constraints or, perhaps, personal tragedy: universally, the psychological burdens to which we subject ourselves"...Passover with its message of hope, tells us that we can escape from that narrow space.

Wishing you and your family a Passover full of hope and meaning.

Letter from the Rabbi

The Season of Welcome

When we arrive at Passover, the celebration of our liberation from Egypt, we make sure to welcome people into our Seder.

This year, TBZ will again participate in "2 for Seder" – making sure that we invite at least two people from other backgrounds to our Seders. This is a national effort to "Push Back on Anti-Semitism with Love and Matzah". We are sponsoring 4 additional guests at our TBZ First Night Seder and hope that many of you will continue this new custom. Sign up here: www.2forseder.org.

Another program that our Jewish community is now working on is called "Student to Student." The Center for Jewish Engagement and Learning, Holocaust Resource Center of Buffalo and the Buffalo Jewish Community Relations Council, were jointly awarded a grant by the St. Louis JCRC to pilot this national peer-to-peer program. The program uses student-to-student dialogue to teach teens about identity, diversity, and inquiry, and to build confidence and acceptance of others. Jewish teens travel to area high schools to engage with their non-Jewish peers. Jewish teens are trained to both share personal stories and authentically and respectfully respond to questions about Jewish identity, culture, values, and religious practices. The presentation resonates highly with other students as it is peer-led, making the content relevant while allowing for informal discussion.

There was an introductory meeting about our community's participation in this pilot program in early March, and it is a very exciting initiative. Our local staff from the Holocaust Resource Center and the Center for Jewish Engagement and Learning have already engaged a number of students for training and then visits to area high schools that have few Jewish students. If any teens or families are interested in participating, please connect directly with me (rabbi@tbz.org), and I will connect you to the right people.

The lesson of our history is retold and emphasized at this time of year – we look to our past experiences of oppression as a lesson to alleviate oppression and difficulty for everyone. We do this when we share our homes on holidays and explain and celebrate our rich traditions and

It's April, and our thoughts immediately turn to Passover. Passover is the most observed of all Jewish holidays in North



America, primarily through the ritual meal of the Seder. The power of the Seder has multiple sources. It is at once a family event at home, an opportunity to absorb a central Jewish narrative, a link across generations, and a celebration of Jewish life and commitment. This year many of our congregants will be attending Temple Beth Zion's 26th Annual Passover Seder....and many will be holding Seders in their homes.

During the Passover season we hear a lot about the biblical verses commanding us to love the stranger because we were strangers in the land of Egypt (Leviticus 19:33–34 and Deuteronomy 10:18–19). These verses have been used for generations to underline our Jewish obligation to care for the oppressed and marginalized, but they can also serve to remind us to be loving toward, and inclusive of, those in our very own Temple Beth Zion community.

Just as every year the haggadah tells us we must see ourselves as if we personally left Egypt and were personally redeemed from oppression, so every year we must push ourselves out of our comfort zones and try to embrace new and "strange" habits of mind and thoughts. These new habits can be as simple as sitting next to someone new at services.... or offering a ride to someone who needs one in order to attend our TBZ Seder.... or inviting someone new (from our TBZ family, or not) to a Seder you are hosting.

We were strangers in the land of Egypt. Let us not be strangers within our Temple Beth Zion community. Our community is looking for connection, and this will continue through monthly events. But let's not wait for these events to form and strengthen our connections.

From the Director

Shortly after I was hired at TBZ I came across a quote that really made an impact on me...enough so that I posted it in my office: Am I doing the right thing at the right time, in the right way and for the right reasons? I'd like to apply that question to Religious School.

As we assess our current program and evaluate possible changes, we should be aware of what others are doing and how successfully. Not too long ago, the URJ (Union for Reform Judaism) conducted a study of over 200 congregational Religious Schools across North America. The result was six key findings about Reform Jewish education. The first three findings are discussed below:

- 1. Structure and Curricular Models. Not every Religious School follows the conventional Sunday morning model. Some offer after-school, small-group or home based, distance/online, or Shabbat-centered learning. Shabbat School is an appealing idea. Including student attendance and participation in the congregation's Shabbat Morning worship services would make learning Hebrew and English liturgy more authentic. Parent participation might increase. I am neither for nor against the idea, but I believe we should have the conversation. Religious School families we will be in touch with you very soon so we can learn more about how to best serve the needs of your family!
- 2. Incremental vs. Radical Change: If we decide to make significant changes to our structural and/or curricular models, how quickly should we go about it?
- 3. Vision and Goals of Jewish Learning: Why do we have a Religious School? What do our parents want for their children? Is it a sense of belonging to the Jewish community? Making Jewish friends? Learning Jewish history? Celebrating holidays? Developing an understanding of Torah, traditions, and mitzvot? Connecting with Israel? Is it Hebrew prayer literacy? These are huge questions and I am convinced there is no one answer for every child and every family.

In the meantime, our Religious School students are engaged and happy to be here on Sunday mornings! There is ruach (spirit) and music throughout the building, students are learning history, customs, and holidays, participating in mitzvah projects, creating artwork of all types to display their understanding, discussing critical issues, becoming more proficient in Hebrew, connecting with their Jewish friends and more.

L'Shalom, may all your journeys be towards peace, Beth



Holy Rollers Back in Gear

Torah scrolls are written by hand with organic ink on parchment made from the skins of animals. Because all of the materials used in the scrolls are natural and organic, they degrade over time, and require special care to maintain their kosher status. The simplest maintenance requirement is regular "airing' of the scrolls. The scrolls are completely unrolled, and allowed to "breathe" for an hour or more, then carefully re-rolled and returned to the Arks for storage. A second important maintenance activity is cleaning years of grime off the surfaces of the scrolls by the simple method of erasing the surfaces of the scrolls with special erasers.



Additionally, the scrolls must be inspected regularly to ensure that the calligraphy remains in good condition; and tears or separations of the panels of parchment must be patched or repaired. special knowledge of Hebrew is required to inspect the scrolls - what is needed is a sharp eye, able to distinguish where the ink individual letters is "broken",

i.e. the ink has stopped adhering to the parchment, leaving only fragments of individual letters. Additionally, Board Member Dr. Philip Glick has undertaken training to repair the stitching that has separated between some panels of our scrolls, and will be working on that task.

TBZ's Holy Rollers are a dedicated group of volunteers committed to engaging in this holy activity. The Holy Rollers meet to clean and inspect the parchment panels, under the guidance of TBZ Clergy, who evaluate the volunteers' "flagging" of possibly "broken" letters. All interested members of the Congregation are invited to join in this mitzvah. Currently, airing, inspecting and erasing are scheduled at 9 a.m. on the following Shabbat mornings: April 11, May 9, May 16, and May 30, in the Delaware Building. (Erasers were not used in the construction of the Temple.) More meetings will be scheduled on different days, including sessions at the Broder Center, in the coming months. If you are interested in participating, please contact Rabbi Freirich at 836-6565 or rabbi@tbz.org.

Finally, if you are planning to make a donation to the Temple in someone's honor or memory, please consider designating your donation to the Torah Restoration Fund. These funds are used to pay professional Sofrim (scribes) to travel to Buffalo and work on restoring the Hebrew calligraphy of the scrolls, and to perform repairs that are beyond the skill level of our lay volunteers.

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
