Reaching In, Reaching Out and Reaching Up

Dear Friends,

"Kol hatchalot kashot:" All beginnings are hard." (Mekhilta Yitro Bachodesh 2)

It is with great pleasure and honor that I join Temple Beth Zion during these next 18 months as your Interim Senior Rabbi.

I understand that beginnings – as well as endings – are difficult. Saying "goodbye" to beloved and respected clergy is not easy. Addressing the challenges surrounding these transitions can be fraught with many different emotions. How do we navigate this journey so that our *k'hilah k'doshah* – our sacred and beloved TBZ community – emerges strengthened, unified, healthy and ready for a successful and bright future?

Over the course of these 18 months, I will be partnering with the TBZ Executive Director, Board, staff and the TBZ members to strengthen relationships, build bridges and enable TBZ to live up to its full potential as the wonderful *kehilah k'doshah* which you are. Accomplishing our task during the pandemic takes a lot of creativity, ingenuity and perseverance, but the end result is worth the effort.

As Interim Senior Rabbi, my three primary areas of focus are:

Congregational Rabbi – I am your rabbi. I will do all those things that a rabbi does: lead Shabbat and holiday worship services, provide pastoral care, teach classes for adults and religious school students, and help represent the synagogue in the community.

Affirmation – One of my main roles will be to LISTEN on multiple levels. First, I will meet with whomever wants to speak with me and listen to your thoughts and feelings about any issue: personal, congregational, and communal. The goal is to enable people to share feelings in a safe and confidential environment, try and resolve issues where possible and figure out a way to move forward in a healthy manner. Second, my role is to help TBZ articulate why your ideals, best practices and traditions are so important.

Visioning/Planning for the Future – Finally, our time together will provide us with the opportunity to reflect, study, strategize and plan for TBZ's long-term successful future with a settled rabbi. Synagogue growth is a process which should be sensitive and inclusive. We will engage in a thoughtful, strategic process to enable us to accomplish this goal.

This will be an interesting time of growth, renewal and transition. Yes, beginnings are hard. But if we follow the (paraphrased) advice of Rebbe Nachman of Bratzlav, we can find a way to come together in strength: "Community can be found by doing three things: Reaching in, reaching out and reaching up: reaching in to [take care of] myself; reaching out [to take care of] those around me; and reaching up to God." This year, let us strengthen our TBZ community by reaching in, reaching out and reaching up. I look forward to meeting all of you!



Cofeld's Corner



Since January 2020, the Cofeld storage areas have been undergoing major reorganization despite the pandemic. Although the museum has a large collection on display, it also has a significant cache of uncatalogued materials consisting of

documents, photographs, and small objects relating to local Jewish organizations and synagogues, Jewish businesses, local families as well as American, Israeli and diaspora Jewry that have yet to be organized. I have worked to establish more formalized spaces, and created a plan of action for addressing this backlog so that, in the near future, we are able to access these wonderful materials.

Part of the reorganization has been made possible with the help of two college student interns. I established an internship agreement with the Museum Studies Program at Buffalo State, so that Temple Beth Zion is recognized as an affiliate site for the next five years. This allowed us to accelerate plans identified as critical for upgrading our internal catalogues and streamlining the different location areas of administrative records, as well as identifying the condition and needs of the Cofeld collections that are already on display. In January 2020, before the lockdown, I hired and trained Sarah Drozda, a museum studies student at Buffalo State in safe handling, cataloguing and condition assessment, so that she could organize a small batch of architectural records created for the 599 and 805 TBZ building complexes.

Once lockdown was imposed, and an in-person internship was no longer viable, we changed plans. We used this opportunity to continue the conversion of the card catalogue into a uniform searchable listing. Using photo images, Sarah continued the work that I and other volunteers had begun already to convert the card catalogue into an Excel listing. This has been a long-term goal, as the current card catalogue does not allow for searching. In July and August, a second intern, Adam Rubin, who is currently a Master's student at Rutgers, continued the cataloguing as a remote internship, and he completed it! Just over 1,100 records are now searchable, and this will help us to change out the display cases in the lobby and hall area that allow for rotation, and create a digitization program in the future.

More recently, Adam and I have been rehousing the archival and museum backlog and the unorganized administrative records into new museum and archival boxes, and record cartons. Old crates and plastic bags have been replaced with acid free enclosures and boxes. New rolling shelving has been assembled and 40 shelves are now filled with labelled action plans for each box of materials.

There is a lot more to do, but the progress is tangible. More excitingly, it has highlighted so many new discoveries that I will share in upcoming months in this new regular column.

I was hired to make TBZ's Religious School the best it could be, and I have dedicated the last year and a half to doing that. But I also recognize and celebrate the opportunities that a freshly minted combined program can offer.

Einav Symons, current Religious School Director of CSS/ Gesher, and I have been asked to work as Co-Directors of the not-yet-named new Community School. I am thankful that Einav and I have a history together as friends and colleagues, forged during the several years we worked together at The Kadimah School of Buffalo. We have many shared values and many complementary skills and passions.

In the coming months we will be making critical decisions regarding curriculum, staffing, scheduling, and scores of other matters. Before we begin, however, we need YOUR input!

If you are a current or prospective TBZ Religious School parent, you should already have received an invitation from me to participate in an online survey to assess your Religious School needs and concerns. The more we can learn about what is important to you and your family, the better we can design a school to meet your needs. Same old, same old may not work for you anymore. Our world pre-Covid was already changing faster than ever before... post-Covid it's a given that the way we live our lives has changed forever. It would be foolish to build a new school without taking all of these changes into account.

So I ask, "WHAT DOES YOUR DREAM RELIGIOUS SCHOOL LOOK LIKE?"

What are your priorities in terms of curriculum, structure, scheduling, and more?



An ancient Kabbalistic custom called for a Seder similar to the Passover meal to celebrate Tu B'Shevat, incorporating figs, dates, pomegranates, olives, grapes, wheat, and barley—or some combination of all of them. - Take a walk, and really pay attention to your surroundings. Bundle up and head to a trail or path. Use all your senses to immerse yourself in the beauty of nature.
- Plant a tree in Israel. The Jewish National Fund has a "Tree Center" on their website: www.jnf.org.

Board Notes

The Board of Trustees met via Zoom on Tuesday, November 10, 2020. Attendees included Board Members Susan Bruckheimer, Adam Field, Philip Glick, David Goldberg, Jody Goldstein, Kenneth Graber, Michael Komm, Toby Laping, Sharon Schwartz, Eric Snitzer, Julie Dressler Weinberg, Amelida Oritz Weinmann, Kaarsten Wisnock and Stephen Yonaty. Also present were Jeff Clark, Julie Feldman, Rabbi Jonathan Freirich, Judy Henn, Andrew Shaevel and Beth Steinberg.

The meeting was called to order and Judy Henn led the Prayer Before a Meeting.

For the Jewish Learning section of the meeting, Kenneth Graber provided a synopsis of the Torah portion, Chayei Sarah. The portion is short but quite a bit happens.

A recap of the Fall Festival was provided. There was a positive vibe in the air at the Festival, with unseasonably great weather, music by Zack Steinberg and lots of TBZ members and guests strolling and shopping.

Kara Kane did a great job and the event was safe and well -organized. The parking lot was full enough to be successful but not so full as to be unsafe. We are likely to hold a similar Festival in April.

Sharon Schwartz announced that the campaign stands at \$42,139. A letter will go out in December to offer another opportunity to participate in the Campaign.

The Ritual Committee prepared a survey for the congregation regarding High Holy Days. The Committee requested Board approval before inviting the congregation to participate.

Kenneth Graber, provided the Board with a written report detailing the timeline, activities and efforts of the Interim Rabbi Search Committee. The email also included the resume of Rabbi Sharon Sobel, whom the committee recommends based upon her training, experience and work with many diverse persons over many years.

The Search Committee, Co-chaired by Ken and Eric Snitzer, included Jess Mabie, Robin Ostrov, Rachel Jackson, Cindy Stover, Steven Davis, Wendee Lorbeer and Larry Rubin.

Kenneth Graber made a motion to authorize the TBZ president David Goldberg to negotiate a contract with Rabbi Sobel. Eric Snitzer seconded the motion. The motion was approved with two abstentions.

Once the negotiations are complete, a Congregational meeting will be called to vote on the Interim Search Committee's recommendation.


Staff members exited the meeting and the Board continued in Executive Session.


