Letter from the Executive Director

There is so much good to be found within the TBZ community.

The past several weeks have been difficult for all of us at TBZ. While I don't want to ignore the realities of our struggles, I want to share some of the positive things happening in our congregation.

We're offering engaging activities at least once each month, even throughout the winter. Keep an eye out for an online trivia contest, a fish fry, and another BBQ in the spring. Our Fall Fair & Bazaar was such a hit that we've already begun booking vendors for a festival in April! These events are fun, inclusive, and produce funds which help us fulfill our mission.

In January, we hope to welcome a new interim rabbi. Rabbis who serve in this capacity are specially trained to help congregations heal from divisive challenges. The candidate selected will help carry us forward and will participate in the recruitment of our next long-term rabbi.

Volunteers Steven Steinberg and Bob Marcus have spent hundreds of hours serving our synagogue by ensuring our facilities receive the TLC they need. Together they've advised and guided us as we made necessary updates to our buildings, established new vendor service contracts, improved our lease agreements, and so much more.

Contract terms with Jewish Family Services of Western New York, our tenant at 805 Delaware, are nearly finalized. The proposed arrangement is beneficial for both organizations and represents a commitment to our longstanding and ever-growing partnership. A team of talented congregants is developing an incredible vision for the Delaware campus, which we hope will someday serve as a centerpiece of Jewish Buffalo, shared with and supported by the greater Jewish community in our region.

We continue to partner with our friends at Congregation Shir Shalom. The focus right now is on next year's Community Religious School and, thereafter, we may look to other collaborations. We all recognize the need to be smart about the limited resources in our community and we have so much to gain by working together.

TBZ has flourished for more than 160 years, and we will continue to serve the Jewish community of Western New York for decades to come. I am a proud fifth-generation TBZer. My grandmother worked in the gift shop and my father served as our President. I LOVE being our Executive Director. I hope you'll join me in sharing a positive vision of our future and support us as we continue to serve you through the ups and downs and twists and turns of life.

Letter from the Rabbi

Chanukah IS a Major Jewish Holiday

Whichever way we spell it, Chanukah is a major Jewish holiday for American Jews.

We do not need to apologize for this.

Many of us know that it isn't a biblical holiday, that it's not mentioned in the Five Books of Moses, and that the rabbis of the Talmud weren't thrilled about it, and that the real reason behind its prominence for American Jews is that it is next to another big holiday. We also know that it has only included gifts in recent decades.

So what?

We declare our Jewishness in the United States, we proclaim our difference from everyone else, by taking on the cultural giant of the year and saying, proudly, that we do something else.

This is so very Jewish.

Let's take a stand this year and embrace Chanukah as the major Jewish holiday that it already is for many of us. Let's make Chanukah into a "dedication celebration" for all eight nights (many of us already do these things) and have fun:

- Decorate our homes with signs of Chanukah and lights and announce who we are and the miracles of the Jewish season and Jewish contributions to America's diverse culture.
- Arrange eight different nights of remote connections with family and friends.
- Join our TBZ community for our big Second Night of Chanukah Shabbat on Friday, December 11, at the special time of 6 p.m. Cantor Rosalie Will, Director of Worship and Music for the Union of Reform Judaism, will lead us as we all light candles from our homes.
- Help our students bring good Chanukah stories to school with them. One of my favorites is Lemony Snicket's: *The Latke Who Couldn't Stop Screaming* https:// smile.amazon.com/dp/B006G85TUQ/

We could all use an excuse for good and safe celebrations done from our homes which allow us to share warmth and light and joy in the world.

Let's remember that being Jewish is about finding miracles all around us and that miracles should be a source of joy.

Engagement Committee News

December brings Chanukah, and the shortest day of the year. It is during this time that we are faced with the most darkness. Those of us who are working outside of our homes often leave for the day and return for the evening in darkness. At times it seems as though nothing but darkness surrounds us.



Chanukah, also known as the "Festival of Lights" is frequently associated with the story of the war in which Judah Maccabee and his followers defeated King Antiochus and the Assyrian army. Following the war, the Maccabees entered the Temple and began to reclaim it from the Assyrians. They immediately relit the *ner tamid*, which was meant to burn constantly. Inside the Temple was a single jar of oil, which was sufficient for only one day. The messenger that was sent to secure additional oil took eight days to complete his mission, and miraculously, the single jar of oil continued to burn until his return. The rabbis of the Talmud attributed the eight days of Chanukah to the miracle of this single jar of oil.

Chanukah, which means "dedication," is the festival that commemorates the purification and rededication of the Temple following the Assyrian occupation of that holy place. Today, the holiday reminds Jews to rededicate themselves to keeping alive the flame of Jewish religion, culture, and peoplehood so that it may be passed on to the next generation.

We are currently struggling with so much. The Covid-19 numbers are increasing. There is continued social and racial and political unrest. Temple Beth Zion is going through some difficult changes. Sometimes things feel dark. I think at this time, more than any other, we need to be the light. We need to rededicate ourselves to our beloved Temple and our Jewish community. We can do this by attending online services, taking part in programs, joining committees, socializing (following Covid safety precautions) with other congregants, or contacting board members with positive suggestions. Remember in these days of darkness that more light is coming with each new day.

Please contact me at any time with questions, comments, or just to say, "hi." I want to connect with each and every one of you. You truly are the brightness of our community, and I am blessed to be working with, and for, you all.

From the Director JEC Develops Curriculum for Children's Resiliency During Pandemic

That was one of the headlines in the 11/9/20 edition of the Cleveland Jewish News. I've never met any of the curriculum team at the Jewish Education Center (JEC) of Cleveland, but I watched all summer long as they created an innovative, meaningful curriculum to provide Jewish children with a toolkit for developing resilience in the face of traumatic events... like a worldwide viral pandemic.

Mental health professionals refer to five basic principles of Trauma-Informed Care: A feeling of safety, being able to remain calm, self and communal efficacy, social connectedness, and hope. The curriculum team at the JEC took these recommendations and correlated them with Jewish history, teachings, and values.

At TBZ, we are one of more than 200 synagogues, involving more than 10,000 children, who have implemented the "La-Bri'ut: To Our Health and Wellness" curriculum. Our Kindergarten - 6th grade learners gather for a brief teacher-led lesson in small multi-age groups during our Sunday morning Religious School Zoom and are then encouraged to pursue Activities or Challenges during the following week. Everyone is invited to share photos or videos of what they've done! And every family is provided with a weekly Family Schmooze to encourage parent-child conversation about these important topics.

During the first 5-week module, "Sukkat Shalom," kids decorated their own shelters of peace using colorful fabric markers to draw on wide strips of muslin fabric. They drew pictures and made collages to show what in their lives provides them with *sukkat shalom*. They interviewed others to learn what makes different people feel safe and protected. They searched their homes for objects (stuffed animals, photos of loved ones, etc.) that make them feel safe. They blew soap bubbles with and without glycerin (which strengthens the fragility of the bubbles) to think about the delicate nature of safety, and to wonder about what might strengthen their own sense of security. And they wrote personal blessings of peace, safety, and protection.

The La-Bri'ut learners are now well into their second module, "Ometz Lev," in which they are discovering how to use their own inner strength to identify difficult emotions and develop strategies to handle those feelings in a healthy way. (Ometz Lev literally translates to "strength of the heart.") During these five weeks, our students will confront many of the following questions: What are BIG FEELINGS and is it okay to have them? Is it okay to lose control and explode when we have BIG FEELINGS? Is it okay to pretend we don't have BIG FEELINGS? What should we do when the people around us are losing control of their BIG FEELINGS? And, what might we learn to do to help others in those situations?

Our younger students made their own Jack-in-the-Boxes with finger puppets, springs, and gift boxes to symbolize the sudden explosion of BIG EMOTIONS. They folded paper fortune tellers and drew their own comic strips to illustrate making good choices in the face of overwhelming feelings. Our older students used their artistic and video skills to analyze how different individuals used *ometz lev* tools in various situations and to what degrees of success.

At the end of the module, everyone will be invited to create a "glitter jar" to represent how our brains behave when we are overwhelmed by big emotions. When one's glitter is swirling, it is hard to think clearly and make good decisions. But, by tapping into one's *ometz lev*, one's inner strength, we allow the glitter to settle. By fully participating in this second module of La-Bri'ut, our children will be empowered to take action for calming themselves in the moment. As we all should learn to do.

Chanukah Blessings

Candles are added to the hanukkiyah (menorah) from right to left but are kindled from left to right. The newest candle is lit first and then the Shabbat candles.

Light the shamash (the helper candle) first, using it to kindle the rest of the Chanukah lights.

As you do, say or sing:

Baruch Ata, Adonai Eloheinu, melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitsvotav v'tsivanu l'hadik ner shel Chanukah.

Blessed are you Adonai, our God, Sovereign of all, who hallows us with mitzvot, and commands us to kindle the Chanukah lights.

Baruch Ata, Adonai Eloheinu, melech haolam, she-asa nisim lavoteinu bayamim haheim bazman hazeh.

Blessed are you Adonai, our God, Sovereign of all, who performed wonderous deeds for our ancestors in days of old at this season.

For first night only:

Baruch Ata, Adonai Eloheinu, melech haolam, she-he-chiyanu v'kiyimanu v'higiyanu lazman hazeh.

Blessed are you Adonai, our God, Sovereign of all, who has kept us alive, sustained us, and brought us to this season.

Hanerot Halalu

We kindle these lights because of the wondrous deliverance You performed for our ancestors. During these eight days of Chanukah, these lights are sacred; we are not to use them but only to behold them, so that their glow may rouse us to give thanks for Your wondrous acts of deliverance.


