We took notes, and much of what was shared we wish to try and implement right away. It was encouraging to know that our members are thinking most of the same things that we on the board are. I would be happy to schedule more of these and look for at least one or two to be held virtually through Zoom later this month.

Our application has been submitted to the Rabbinic placement office, and we are now actively engaged in the process of finding our new spiritual leader. The input we received from all of you to our surveys was invaluable. Many thanks to members of the Cantor search committee who processed the idea of a survey. Their efforts were tremendous and laid the ground work for the existing search. At the moment, we have suspended the Cantor search on the advice of the placement offices, as finding a new permanent Rabbi is our immediate priority. Letter from the Rabbi

Commemoration and Celebration

November 2021 gives us so many wonderful events to celebrate: Thanksgiving in person with family and friends (cautiously, to be safe); Chanukah, with candles burning brightly, latkes sizzling and dreidles spinning; and this year, Consecration of TBZ's new Religious School students from 2020 and 2021.

Our hearts overflow with gratitude for the blessing of being able to gather and celebrate.

At the same time, November gives us pause for reflection: November 9-11 we commemorate *Kristallnacht* – The Night of Broken Glass. This was the series of pogroms that took place in 1938 in Germany, destroying hundreds of synagogues, Jewish shops, schools and homes, many people murdered and beaten. This was the prelude to the Holocaust.

On November 11, we also honor our US Armed Service Veterans, thank them for their service and reflect on the meaning of war and peace.

All of these seemingly unconnected events: American Thanksgiving, Chanukah, Consecration, *Kristallnacht* and Veterans' Day share something in common: hope for the future, hope for a brighter tomorrow, a celebration of freedom of religion. We root ourselves in the stories of our past and teach them to our children because the values are timeless. They are also all connected to the central theme of "Chanukah."

The word "chanukah" means "dedication." Historically, Chanukah is a celebration of religious freedom - freedom of the Jewish people's right to practice our own religion in our own country in safety and security. We celebrate the rededication of our Temple in Jerusalem which had been desecrated by the Greek army in 165 BCE. The actual ritual celebration evolved to become a "Festival of Lights." The Pilgrims came to the America seeking religious freedom, when we observe Kristallnacht, we remember those who suffered because of their religion. And when we "consecrate" or "dedicate" our new students beginning their religious school studies for the first time, we celebrate that they are able to learn and celebrate their Jewish heritage openly and freely. We honor our Veterans who fought for the rights of our country and others to live as a free people.

Chanukah Blessings

Candles are added to the *hanukkiyah* (menorah) from right to left but are kindled from left to right. The newest candle is lit first. On the Shabbat of Hanukkah, kindle the Hanukkah lights first and then the Shabbat candles.

Light the shamash (the helper candle) first, using it to kindle the rest of the Hanukkah lights. As you do, say or sing:

בָּרוּדְ אַתָּה יְיָ אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֱלֶדְ הָעוֹלָם, אֲשֶׁר קדְּשֶׁנוּ בְּמִצְוֹתָיו, וִצְנַנוּ לִהַדְלִיק נֵר שֵׁל חַנֵּכָּה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tsivanu l'hadlik ner shel Hanukkah.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who hallows us with mitzvot, commanding us to kindle the Hanukkah lights.

בָּרוּדְ אַתָּה יִיָ אֶלהֵינוּ מֶלֶדְ הָעוֹלָם, שֶׁעָשָׂה נִסִּים לַאֲבוֹתֵינוּ וְאִמוֹתֵינוּ בַּיָּמִים הָהֵם בַּזְמַן הַזֶּה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, she-asah nisim laavoteinu v'imoteinu bayamim hahaeim baz'man hazeh.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who performed wonderous deeds for our ancestors in days of old at this season.

For first night only:

Coming from a mixed heritage of Iraqi, Moroccan & Polish Jews, Guy's music is a meeting point between different rivers of inspiration flowing freely into each other. A trained concert pianist with the energy of a rock star and a jazz musician's sense of adventure who's unafraid to throw into the mix his native middle-eastern scales and rhythms. The New York Times said, "Mintus, a 27-year-old pianist who hails from Israel, pours together a mixed brew of influences — Arabic maqam, Jewish folk song, Eastern European dance rhythms and, especially, classic hard bop — with such ebullient grace that you'd think they all originated in the very same place."

Guy's awards include the "Leonard Bernstein Award" by ASCAP and the Bernstein Family Foundation, and the Prix du Public at the Montreux Jazz Festival's solo piano competition. His debut record, "A Home in Between," has been selected as DownBeat Magazine's Editor's Pick. His sophomore release, "Connecting the Dots," has been celebrated in concerts throughout the US, Canada, France, Switzerland, Germany, Israel, Turkey, and Kazakhstan.

We look forward to welcoming Guy to Buffalo and gathering together safely to celebrate the Holiday through music and community. The concert will take place on November 28, the first day of Chanukah, from 1- 2:30 p.m. Check-in will begin at 12:30 p.m. Tickets can be purchased on the JCC website at www.jccbuffalo.org.

Letter from the Executive Director

TBZ's Hot Topics

Below are some important TBZ matters and their status: <u>Kleinhans</u>

- The venue and services were beautiful and congregants overwhelmingly reported a deeply meaningful High Holy Days experience.
- Recordings of the services are available on our YouTube channel.
- Regarding why we were at Kleinhans in the first place, discussions began in May and the decision had to be made in July. At that time:
 - We expected our Delaware building to be under construction during Rosh Hashanah, which meant the temporary loss of the women's restroom closest to the Sanctuary.
 - We'd been informed by the town that Delaware Avenue would be under construction, causing traffic and parking challenges.
 - After a series of technical glitches, we had concerns about the reliability of our AV system for the most important holy days of the year.
 - Most importantly, Kleinhans offered double the capacity of our Sanctuary, meaning it would be easier to facilitate physical distancing and help prevent the spread of Covid.

Covid Protocols

- Masks continue to be required for in-person events.
- Masks are not required but are strongly recommended for outdoor events.
- We are not requiring proof of vaccination to attend events or services. There was a rumor that proof of vaccination was required for Kleinhans, but that was their policy for BPO events; they allowed us to follow our own protocols for our services.

Worship Opportunities

- Friday night Erev Shabbat services are being held inperson at 805 Delaware Ave. They are now at 7 p.m. and are typically take place in the Sisterhood Chapel, except for Classical services (usually the 3rd Friday of the month) and other special events held in the Sanctuary.
- We continue to offer Saturday morning Torah Study via Zoom.
- Saturday morning Shabbat Services are on Zoom unless there is a B'nai Mitzvah.

- Work has begun on the roof over JFS. It took longer to get going than we'd hoped, due in part to the global shortage of building materials, but we are very excited to be moving forward.
- Our Cofeld museum is moving to the hallway area between the Sanctuary and the Chapel that we currently refer to as our library. The space will be completely overhauled in the months ahead. Special thanks to Chana Kotzin for putting in an extraordinary amount of hours to make this transition happen, and Adam Rubin for his significant efforts as well.
- The men's cloak room will become a brand new women's restroom.
- When we've completed the work associated with our lease with JFS, we will turn our attention to other projects such as putting a new roof on the Fink Auditorium, looking at lighting in the Chapel, and replacing the carpet in the hallway.

Our Plans for Broder

- We are exploring our options as they relate to investing in the Broder Center as our long-term suburban presence, or prospectively selling the building and relocating our offices.
- Absolutely no decisions have been made and we are only in the initial brainstorming stages.

Partnering with Congregation Shir Shalom

- TBZ's partnership in the Community Religious School with Congregation Shir Shalom and Temple Beth Tzedek has been extraordinarily successful. More than 140 children are enrolled and so far it has been all smiles.
- We are always looking at opportunities to celebrate holidays and special events together.

Clergy Searches

• Customarily, Executive Directors are not direct participants in the search for rabbis or cantors. Please see updates from our President and/or the respective committee Chairs elsewhere in the Bulletin.

- We're planning to get several new committees going, such as Member Engagement, Clergy Liaison, and Marketing & Communications.

There are those who still threaten to fracture our world today. Every day, we read examples of xenophobia (fear of foreigners or "the other"), hatred, violence, war, bloodshed, refugees with nowhere to go, hunger, poverty, homelessness, racism. The list of maladies afflicting us seems never-ending.

It is appropriate that our month of November ends with Chanukah and the lighting of the Chanukah candles.

Chanukah is all about hope. The flames on the candles remind us that all it takes is one spark to light a flame: a flame that leads to justice, a flame that leads to healing and wholeness. One flame in the darkness can bring great light, great warmth to a very dark place: one spark of righteous deeds can inspire others to do the same.

This Chanukah, this Festival of Lights, as we kindle our Chanukah candles beginning on Sunday, November 28th, I hope that we can dedicate ourselves anew to bringing justice, hope and light to our broken world.

Let each of us be that spark or flame that ignites others to join in repairing our world: *"ani v'atah n'shaneh et ha'olam"* – together, you and I can change the world. *"*

And we'll work together to keep the flame alive, as Peter, Paul and Mary sang: "Don't Let the Light Go Out"

We. Have. Had. Fun!

In the past two months the students at the new Community Religious School have learned, laughed, collaborated on art projects, and listened as their teachers read or told wonderful stories. They have participated in meaningful conversations, crafted edible sukkahs, shaken the lulav and smelled the etrog in the sukkah, and reviewed the letters of the Alefbet. They have heard their cantors and rabbis chanting Torah outside, made and hung sukkah decorations, asked and answered questions about the fall holidays and Jewish history, worked in small groups to practice reading prayers, and have heard and spoken a little bit of everyday Hebrew... and they have had fun!

In August I wrote a short piece for MY JEWISH BUFFALO, the Jewish Federation's weekly Friday email to the Buffalo Jewish community. The title was "Measuring Success in Smiles". Prior to the opening of the Community Religious School, I suggested that the "success of this opening year should be measured in smiles. By kids who feel seen, heard, and valued. By kids who make new friends. By kids who feel happy and safe at religious school."

Just a few weeks into this new venture, we are seeing those smiles we hoped for. We are actually seeing many, many smiles! The expected uncertainty and jitters of the first day have quickly faded away. (I'm not only talking about students...parents, teachers, lay leadership, everyone working "behind the scenes" — we all felt some level of anxiety that first day!)

Now, as the names, faces, and routines have become more familiar, our students hop out of their parents' cars happily and enthusiastically on Sunday mornings, eager to enter the building, find their friends, and discover what is going to happen in their classrooms that morning.

Our teachers, with the help of our teaching assistants and madrichim, have made their classrooms welcoming, their lessons engaging, and are committed to supporting all of our students. We have more religious diversity in our classrooms than ever before, as Community Religious School families come from a wide spectrum of Jewish practice and belief. Our rabbis and teachers are committed to making the Community Religious School welcoming to all.

Some of your children have been attending religious school or other similar programming since they were toddlers. Others (at all grade levels) have never attended religious school before. And some of your kids aren't totally new, but did not participate in virtual religious school last year. We are committed to making sure that all of your children feel welcome. As we've said over and over again, we are creating a new *Kehilla Kedosha/Sacred Community*. The smiles we've been seeing tell us it's working!

Confirmation & L'Taken

In recent weeks, TBZ's Confirmation Class of 2021-22 has begun to meet with Rabbi Sobel in preparation for their Confirmation Ceremony during Erev Shavuot services on Saturday evening, June 4, 2022. Comprised of students in both 10th and 11th grades, the Confirmation Class will be participating in a year-long exploration of Jewish teachings and values. At each monthly meeting, the students will have an opportunity to reflect on their own personal Jewish identity and their place within the adult Jewish community.

Some of these students, as well as other TBZ teens, will also be participating in L'Taken, a 3-day Social Justice Seminar for Reform Jewish teens. Our group is scheduled for early February in Washington DC. L'Taken, a program of the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism, exposes high school students to contemporary issues in social justice and prepares them to spend a day lobbying our local representatives in Congress. Participation in L'Taken is an opportunity to fulfill the commandment of "Tzedek, tzedek tirdof, justice, justice you shall pursue."

Cantorial Search Update

Dear Fellow Temple Beth Zion Members,

We would like to update you on the latest with the Cantorial Search process.

First, we were thrilled with our High Holy Day Cantor, Ted Labow. Cantor Labow and Rabbi Sobel worked together all summer to ensure that the High Holy Days would be beautiful, meaningful, spiritual and moving. We are so very grateful for their hard work and efforts.

We are also very grateful for cantorial soloist Sara Schultz's participation with Judy Henn over the High Holy Days. She and Judy also planned together all summer to make sure that the family services at Becker farms and on Yom Kippur morning would be beautiful, meaningful, spiritual and moving.

Finally, our cantorial soloists Sara Schultz, Zack Steinberg and Dr. Lori Ullman (accompanied by Dr. David Bond) have made sure that we have no gaps in our musical accompaniment for any of our Erev Shabbat or B'nai Mitzvah services since January. All of our Shabbat services are filled with *ruach* (spirit) and meaning. Erev Shabbat on Friday usually takes place in person at our Delaware building and Shabbat mornings usually take place via Zoom (and in person at Delaware when we have a Bar/Bat Mitzvah).

Next, the American Conference of Cantors Placement office and the Central Conference of American Rabbis placement have both strongly recommended that the rabbinic search should take place before our cantorial search. It is critical that the settled rabbi has input into the hiring of the cantor since the two of them will be working in close partnership with each other.

To ensure the success of our future rabbi-cantor relationship, the Executive Committee is heeding this advice and is disbanding the Cantorial Search Committee. Temple Beth Zion president, David Goldberg will form a new Cantorial Search Committee when we are ready to move forward.

I want to thank the outgoing Cantorial Search Committee for their dedication, commitment and hard work to date. The work they accomplished will be useful when it's time to begin a new cantorial search. We are so very grateful for their time, efforts and service.

It is always an honor and privilege to serve the congregation we love.

We are pleased to share that the application which officially begins the search for a rabbi has been delivered to CCAR. We will issue further updates on the process as we have steps to report.


