Letter from the President

Summer appears to be finally upon us.

Forgive the pun, but things are also heating up here at Temple Beth Zion.

The construction project at 805 Delaware is well under way. Planning for our annual Summer Celebration is well under way. Mailings with all the details about our Annual Meeting will be coming later this month. Welcoming plans for Rabbi Gutmann are also well under way. His first service will be Friday July 1 at 7 p.m. Please come join us to welcome him!

Please join us on Friday, June 10 for Rabbi Sharon Sobel's last service as we thank her for all her hard work and her time spent here.

Collections have now started for our Afghan Resettlement project. As promised, I share a more detailed list of items that we will be looking to collect.

To set up the kitchen: Tableware, dishes, drinking glasses, pots and pans (no Teflon or old scratched up ones please), mixing/serving bowls, can openers (non electric), cutting board(s), dish soap, dish drying rack and sponges.

Household items: Clothes hangers, shower curtain/liner, bath mat, light bulbs, batteries and smoke detector batteries, cleaning supplies including mops and brooms, all purpose cleaners and Windex, paper towels, toilet paper, waste baskets, Kleenex, and trash bags.

Personal hygiene products: Hand sanitizer, shampoo, toothbrushes and toothpaste, bar soap, diapers (if we have small children), hand and bath towels.

Food staples: Rice, cooking oil, salt, pepper, sugar, spices, dry beans, crackers. NO canned food of any kind or pork products.

Other strongly suggested items: Box fans, laundry basket/bag, plastic bins for food storage, pot holders, clothes drying rack, plastic & foil wrap, strainer/colander, end tables, lamps, coffee table, blankets and quilts.

Furniture: We have had many inquiries about this. We are looking for almost new or very gently used. These items may be donated on a call first basis so we can arrange for pick up, depending on what we may actually need.

It is important that most of these items are preferably new, or very gently used and clean. We want our families to feel welcome and comfortable. Nice things in nice shape make that transition all the more easier.

Please contact us if you would like to be part of this in a small or large way. Remember, it takes a village!

Letter from the Rabbi

#### A Blessing for Temple Beth Zion

It has been my honor to serve this sacred community for the past the 18 months. It has also been my joy to lead together with many volunteers and staff who make Temple Beth Zion the unique liberal Jewish community serving this part of Western New York.

I write this during the days between Pesach and Shavuot. We learn in the Torah at Pesach that every generation is responsible for teaching the story of our redemption from Egypt to the next generation. It is our obligation to see ourselves as if each of us has personally been liberated from bondage in Egypt. What does this mean? It means that we have a communal responsibility to ensure that each of us knows and understands our history and that our history is meaningless unless it points us toward an envisioned future. The spiritual life of our community depends on each of us carrying out our responsibilities to the best of our ability. God didn't just bring us out of slavery in Egypt to relieve us of our bondage - God redeemed us so that we could act as God's hands and help others as well. Our text teaches that God will be present in the community's midst only if everyone carries their weight of the burden.

We also learn from our celebration of receiving Torah at Shavuot that our envisioned future includes a life of Torah. This isn't Torah in a vacuum. Rather, in this context, Torah means a life of connection to God, a life of connection to community and a life of connection to mitzvot – sacred deeds.

In my time here at Temple Beth Zion serving as your Interim Senior Rabbi, there are many people who truly understand this message and live lives of *Torah* and *Mitzvot*. Many of you have aimed to carry out our share of our responsibility for our Jewish life here at TBZ with great love, devotion, wisdom, grace and dignity. Not to say that the path has always been clear and easy – but our working together toward a common goal has always been at the forefront. None of us could have done what we need to do without people joining together, carrying their share of the burden, adding their unique contribution to our congregation's life.

I will have an opportunity to thank everyone on Friday, June 10<sup>th</sup> at my official farewell Shabbat service. I hope to see as many of you as possible. If you would like to stay in touch with me after I leave, you can reach me at: rabbisharonsobel@gmail.com.

#### From the Directors

Thank you! Thank you! Thank you!

To all of the parents who entrusted their kids and their kids' Jewish education to us this year, we deeply appreciate your confidence in us and your commitment to the Community Religious School.

The first year of any new venture is naturally the hardest. We took two existing religious schools, three congregations, an assortment of in-person and online faculty, a mix of staff, various committees of lay leaders, three Rabbis, two Cantors, and over 140 students and molded it all together into a program that was unquestionably a success! And we did so as a highly contagious and potentially deadly virus continued to threaten us all.

Whether your child was in Kindergarten, 7th grade, or anywhere in between, their Sunday mornings were spent discovering the joy and excitement of Jewish learning, building connections with their peers, evolving their Jewish identity, and increasing their knowledge base of holidays, Torah, *mitzvot*, Jewish practice, and Hebrew prayer literacy.

These goals were accomplished as our students painted leaves to decorate our CRS Mitzvah Tree, acted out biblical stories, sang and danced with Shira Zack, recited the brachot for lulav and etrog, practiced being Torah scribes, twisted their bodies into the shapes of the AlefBet, donated food for the Turkey Basket Project, decorated Tzedakah boxes and other ritual objects, developed relationships with elderly residents at Amberleigh, engaged with their 1-on-1 Hebrew tutors on Zoom, designed and built huge and colorful chanukkiyot, learned about the land and people of Israel, held a Torah in their arms, joyfully played games of chance at our Purim Carnival, tried on tallit and practiced wrapping tefillin, sang "Hatikvah" all together for the community Yom HaShoah video, made their own matzo for Passover, listened to a first-hand account of one Holocaust survivor's story, created a banner of Israeli flags and competed in a mini-Maccabi outdoors at the JCC to celebrate Yom Ha'Atzmaut. (These are just some of the highlights of the year.)

We know there is much more to accomplish and we look forward to the opportunity to continue to grow this community of learners, teachers, rabbis, and families, to strengthen the bonds between our three synagogues, to bring parents into the building and into our learning experiences, and to explore Judaism in many more exciting and rewarding ways. We hope we continue to have your trust and your support. We have only just begun!





#### **Dedicating a Temple**

Sometimes a gem can be hidden in the most non-descript packaging, and yet once opened deliver a surprise gift of memory and aspiration. The recording of the first of several dedication ceremonies of Temple Beth Zion was discovered during the reorganization of the Cofeld unprocessed backlog materials. It was still in its original brown packaging, never opened and with the date of April 19, 1967 hastily written on the overwrap. There were six (!) ceremonies in total for the dedication week as well as a separate thank you ceremony for all who made the construction possible. Part of this was to pay tribute to all the elements of the new temple: the relationships with other local clergy, the American Jewish Reform movement, Ben Shahn windows, the organ and so much more. It was also a way to include broad participation in a momentous event for the temple. So this tantalizing "find" was filled with anticipation and possibility as, to date, it is the only full length recording of a dedication ceremony we have. After more than 50 years in the original film canister would it still work? With the support of Larry Rubin and Debra Chernoff (with Larry also delivering and collecting the precious film in person), it was taken to a specialized restorer and the two -inch black and white Quad tape is now in digital form.

It's a time capsule that allows us to hear the voice of Rabbi Dr. Martin L. Goldberg once more, as well as that of Assistant Rabbi. Arnold I. Sher. The dedicatory sermon is delivered by Dr. Maurice N. Eisendrath,



in his then role as President of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, (the forerunner to the Union of Reform Judaism). It is a look *into* as well as a look *back* at April 1967 at a pivotal moment in the temple's history and the philosophy of American Reform Judaism. Among other comments, Maurice Eisendrath highlights the artistry of the new temple and Beth Zion's history in the movement as well as a prescription for its future. Temple Beth Zion had "dared to sing a new song in stone, steel, mortar and brick," symbolic of the new beginning after six years without a spiritual home.

The film begins a little after the service itself has begun, but captures most of the dedication in a 70-minute run with

several views focused on the bimah, the choir, the organ (and its rescued Lafayette Theater trumpets) and the congregation. Seven candle lighters come up to the bimah to dedicate the temple representing different ages and roles within the temple community. Each kindles a candle in the menorah for a specific attribute for the new House of God: Truth (Sisterhood: Arlene Arbesman), Love (Men's Club: Alvin Small), Justice (TBZ Forum: John Laping), Courage (Young People: Clifford Day), Peace (Religious School: Bonnie Posmantur), Holiness (Adult Education: Dr. Murray Bloustein) and Faith (Memorials Committee: Paul Dosberg). After several decades of quietly waiting for rediscovery, the tape is now restored and will be one of the digital items available in the new museum. Watch this space for more updates next month!

#### **Ritual Committee**




