Letter from the Rabbi

Our Most Sacred Possession

A story is told of a small shtetl long ago that was attacked by bandits. They held the town hostage in the town hall. There, the bandits demanded all the wealth of the shtetl.

The people cried, "Do not hurt us, for we are poor."

Yet, the bandits pressed, "You must have something of value."

Two men stepped forward and shared, "If you agree to leave these people in peace, we will bring you a chest filled with our most sacred possession."

The bandits agreed and so the men went off. Some time later, the two men came back carrying a heavy trunk. They set it upon a table and opened it. Inside it was filled to the brim with books of wisdom and one aged Torah scroll, the most precious belongings of all.

We have had much taken from us, and recent times have been particularly full of challenges. Most of us have lost something. Some of us have lost more than others, but none of us are not lost.

Beginning this past month, Temple Beth Zion, for the first time since the start of the pandemic, began reading regularly from the Torah scroll in the Sisterhood Chapel. For me, this opportunity and occasion to gather again on Saturday mornings as a *minyan* has equaled any other since my arrival to Temple Beth Zion. The joy I saw on the faces of those who gathered in person and online; the feelings of warmth and inclusion, of sacred community and harmony. The positivity as we began a new chapter was impalpable.

Certainly, our work has only begun. We have relationships to rebuild; hurts to heal, and this will take time. Yet, as we tenderly returned the Torah following the reading, our most valuable treasure, we called out as we always have, *chadesh yameinu k'kedem*, renew our days like they were before. O God, restore us to our former position, and help us to rebuild your loving house of Zion, hand in hand, heart to heart.

So much rebuilding is happening right now. We have a wonderful fresh Temple Board, with new ideas and new energy. We have a reinvigorated staff excited for what the future might bring, and we have congregants who want to see our Temple restored to strength – a new strength that brings Torah to a new era filled with innovation, imagination, and hope.

Mask Policy for In-Person Gatherings

Annual Meeting Review & Farewell

For those of you who could not attend or view the Temple Beth Zion Annual Meeting on June 23rd, I share a recap of the evening.

I invited Andrew Shaevel, head of our Governance Committee, to lead the meeting. We began with a prayer, led by Clergy Associate Judy Henn.

Cindy Stover represented Sisterhood and shared some of the year's highlights and plans for the coming year. A generous donation check was presented to Temple Beth Zion on behalf of the TBZ Sisterhood, bringing their total support for the 2021-2022 fiscal year to more than \$5,600.

Kathy Ellis joined Cindy to share information on some of the many events planned to welcome Rabbi Gutmann. Cindy and Kathy are co-chairing the Rabbi Transition Task Force and they have been busy planning, with lots of volunteer and staff support, events that will allow all congregants the opportunity to meet Rabbi Gutmann and his family.

I presented my President's report. I won't go into long detail, but I would like to share one invitation I made that evening. TBZ members will not see a dues increase in the coming year. That being said, I invite you to, figuratively speaking, "take your temple out for coffee" once per week. That \$5 cup of Starbucks after one full year = \$260. Can you take your Temple to coffee?

Ken Graber presented the annual Treasurer's report. He then opened the floor to questions regarding the operating budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, as approved by the Financial Planning Committee. The budget was approved by the congregation as presented.

Andrew Shaevel, on behalf of the Governance Committee, introduced the slate of nominees for the Board of Trustees: Jennifer Field, Joni Shatkin, Barry Singer and Samantha White for three-year terms ending in June 2025; Kerri Blabac and Larry Rubin, for two-year terms ending in June 2024; and David Gordon and Aaron Mango for oneyear terms ending in June 2023.

The slate of nominees was approved. Andy shared that Cindy Stover and Errol Sull will continue as representatives of Sisterhood and Brotherhood respectively and David Goldberg will now serve as Past President.

Andy thanked the members of the Governance Committee; Julie Weinberg, Ellen Weiss, Phil Glick, Daniel Kotzin, Howard Rosenhoch, David Brock and Ken Polk for working together with him to assemble a wonderful slate of nominees who will bring new ideas, energy and enthusiasm to the TBZ Board. We recognized a number of trustees who are leaving the board, but not leaving us. Adam Field, Daniel Kotzin, Toby Laping, Amelida Weinmann, Lewis Shaevel and Julie Weinberg have all served their terms on the board, and we appreciate all their time and dedication. Andrew Shaevel is also stepping down as head of the Governance committee, and I cannot thank him enough for all his service.

There was some discussion regarding the next agenda item, updating our TBZ bylaws. Most of the revisions are minor language corrections, and the rest allow the board a little more flexibility with regard to the number of board seats. A question was raised about the seats on the Board for our Temple Auxiliaries. The response to the question was that it is the responsibility of Sisterhood, Brotherhood and TBaZY to select their representatives to serve on the Board of Trustees. If there is not a designee of an auxiliary, the Board, in consultation with the Governance Committee, may choose to fill that Trustee position with a Member of the Congregation for a term of one year.

The congregation voted to approve the changes to the Temple Beth Zion bylaws.

I then shared Rabbi Sharon Sobel's farewell remarks and blessings for the future of Temple Beth Zion before turning things over to Ken Polk who shared a bit about his vision and hopes for the future.

As directed by the bylaws, the Board had a brief meeting immediately following the Annual Meeting to select their Officers for 2022-2023. The Board accepted the Governance Committee recommendations for the following: President -Kenneth Polk; Vice Presidents – Kenneth Graber, Sharon Schwartz, Stephen Yonaty; Treasurer – Laurence Rubin; Secretary – Robin Ostrov.

Finally, I would like to address the membership of Temple Beth Zion. Thank you for your steadfast devotion to this synagogue through a very turbulent time. Thank you for staying the course and your understanding as we navigated a myriad of issues, including a pandemic. We are about to embark on a new chapter in our storied history. Rabbi Gutmann is ready to get to work. Ken Polk and the Board are ready to get to work. This is the time for new hope, and renewed enthusiasm for our congregation.

It has been an honor to serve as president. And I look forward to our future.

Last month, 805 Delaware was repainted and newly carpeted, and in less than two months, we will gather in person and online to observe the *yamim noraim*, the High Holy Days, in our sanctuary. I am excited to share that Cantor Ted Labow will be with us again this year, and we will be sharing more details in the coming weeks.

One more note before I conclude: I wish to thank the Temple Beth Zion family, for all the ways you have supported me as I have begun my rabbinate here. To the incredible staff and lay leadership for the ways they have rallied to do what is best for Temple Beth Zion and to help me succeed. To the remarkable congregants and community leaders who have hosted and attended meet and greets, gatherings, services, and who have extended their hands in partnership.

I am especially grateful for how you have helped my family following my wife Jill's slip and suffering of an olecranon fracture on our second night in Buffalo. Thank you for all your generous support and sympathy, and thank you for helping us have a sense of humor about it. Fortunately, she is on the mend. By the publication of this article, she should be out of a cast with permission for light normal use. She is expected to be fully back to normal by Labor Day.
