Letter from the President

Prior to joining the Board at Temple Beth Zion, I served on the St. Lawrence University Alumni Executive Council for 10 years, two as its president. During my tenure, I was an ex-officio member of the Board of Trustees and was invited to share the invocation at my very first meeting. Not sure what to do, I did what most nice Jewish boys should do and I called my rabbi. At that time, it was Rabbi Harry Rosenfeld, who after hearing my question, immediately had an idea. He told me of a prayer:

"Baruch atah adonai eloheinu melekh ha'olam asher kidshanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu la'asok betzorkhei tzibur. Blessed are you God, ruler of the universe, for commanding us to busy ourselves with the needs of the community."

I shared this prayer with the St. Lawrence Board of Trustees in October 2008 and they loved it! In fact, some asked for a copy of it to share with other organizations which they supported as it was so meaningful to them.

Fast forward from 2008 and the end of my time on the St. Lawrence Alumni Board, to 2010 when I first joined the TBZ Board and found out that all board meetings opened with this prayer...and it is still used today.

As I thought about its meaning, I found out some interesting things. First, the verb "la'asok" is the same verb in Hebrew as the one used in the prayer "to engage in the study of Torah." I also found that according to Jewish law, Torah study sometimes takes precedence over other *mitzvot*. On top of that, some rabbis believed that serving the community was at the same holy level as Torah study, and therefore being occupied with the needs of the community is equivalent to being occupied with matters of Torah.

So, in addition to me having a personal connection to this prayer, Clergy Associate Judy Henn shared with me that her good friend, Cantor Susan Wehle, of blessed memory, used to translate the prayer for studying Torah as "La'asok b'divrei Torah - let us soak ourselves in the words of Torah." Since the same word, "la'asok", is also used in this blessing, we could say "Let us soak ourselves in the needs of the community together."

Whether "busying", "occupying," or "soaking" ourselves with the needs to the community, the prayer is a reminder at the beginning of each board meeting that our time together is sacred and that our work, too, is sacred as we focus on the needs of the community.

Letter from the Rabbi

Turning and Returning

As Jews, we live our lives by two calendars, the English and the Hebrew, and both have their ebbs and flows. The Hebrew year is structured around two intensive Jewish festival periods, Spring and Fall. In this sense, our yearly calendar moves in a cycle, but our world also has its trajectory.

We are gradually emerging from what has been one of our world's most challenging periods. Our strength has been tested and so has our faith, but as the Hebrew calendar approaches the Days of Awe again, an opportunity to check in on this path to physical and spiritual healing is before us. Our liturgical calendar reflects the calendar of the year. Traditionally, we start reciting the words of Psalm 27 daily during the month of Elul and continue through Sukkot. This psalm contains the words, "One thing I ask of the Eternal, only that do I seek: to live in God's house all the days of my life, to gaze upon the beauty of the Eternal, and to frequent God's Temple." (Ps. 27:4)

As we return, our liturgy evokes memories of comfort—memories of being at Temple. I personally remember climbing beneath the metal bleachers as a young child in my grandpa's synagogue as the cantor chanted the prayers, and I have heard some of you share stories of disappearing to the youth lounge or lazily exploring Becker Farms while the service was conducted. All of us hope to rediscover joy from seasons past. This itself, return, rediscovery, and our rebirth as former, purer, less-beleaguered selves is contained in the High Holy Days overarching theme of *t'shuva*, return.

For so many of us, Temple Beth Zion is central to our Jewish identity. As our world emerges from its trauma, we also yearn to see our Temple emerge and return to health. But, things are not as they were. The landscapes of American and Jewish life have changed. Indeed, our Temple has been hurt, but we have not lost hope. There is a way to be a healthy, vital congregation whatever our state, and we will endure.

Moreover, we still have the chance to gather with old friends and family, and, if they live only in our memories, we still can rejoice in their continued legacy of children and grandchildren. As time cycles and we experience the trajectory of the years, it is possible "to live in God's house again"—to be inspired once again, yet, what inspired yesterday may not be the same as today. Some things remain the same while others change.

A new Rabbi, new President, a Cofeld Museum (mostly) new Board, and coming soon...a new Benjamin and Dr. Edgar

R. Cofeld Judaic Museum. As you have noticed, the entire first floor hallway of 805 Delaware is taking on a brand new look. A new entrance for Jewish Family Services is under construction on the Barker Street end of the building to allow them to have their reception space and boardroom on the first floor, and a long needed elevator to their second floor headquarters. This work will keep an important Jewish community agency as our tenant for the next 15 years. It also created an opportunity for us to move the Cofeld Museum out of its cramped spaces at the end of the building, and to reimagine how this priceless collection of Buffalo Jewish history and Jewish religious and community life will be preserved and presented for future generations.

By these High Holidays, you should see the fruits of the work of the Cofeld Museum Task Force, comprised of Co-Chair, Susan Adelman, Museum Curator, Chana Kotzin, PhD., Jean DuBow and Judith Judelsohn, and local museum exhibit designer, Scott Wood. The Museum will be centrally located in the main hallway between the Sanctuary and Sisterhood Chapel, and Rabbi Fink Auditorium. You will literally experience the museum as you walk from one end of the building to the other. The main exhibits will be in the library and courtyard rooms with lots of natural light (but with plenty of UV protection). It will be open and far less crowded than the original Museum, and with more information about the history of Temple Beth Zion and the building itself, which is on the National Register of Historic Places.

While you will notice that there will be fewer artifacts on permanent display at any one time, (we actually had over 1,000 on display previously) we are making plans to do programs and special exhibits with our entire collection, periodically rotating pieces, reaching out to the congregation to lend some of their own family history for these events, and working with other local institutions such as the Buffalo History Museum and the Burchfield Penney Art Center. Our long term goal is to have the Museum experience be woven into many aspects of Temple life. We want to acknowledge the foresight of Bertha Cofeld whose generosity created the endowments for the Museum, and to the incredible work of Harriet and Mort Spiller in their dedication to carrying our Bertha's vison.

The next step is to reactivate the Cofeld Museum permanent committee to be stewards of the collection, plan special events and programs, and train docents to provide tours of our incredible building and museum. (What's Happening at CRS)

As Rosh Hashanah can be felt on the horizon, it brings with it a promise of new beginnings. First, I truly hope it is the beginning of a healthy year, not restricted by Covid!

The Community Religious School serves the students of Temple Beth Tzedek, Temple Beth Zion, Congregation Shir Shalom and unaffiliated families. One community, one community school. CRS provides engaging curriculum which includes Holidays, Israel, Torah, Ethics/Values, Life cycle, History, Art and Music. The Hebrew curriculum is taught as private, remote lessons to students from 1st through 7th grade. Hebrew is reinforced during T'fillah time on Sundays. This initiative has been highly successful and was well received by the students:

- "I loved learning Hebrew! It gave me time to work privately and at my own pace." (Evelyn F, 3rd grade)
- "I really like Hebrew online tutoring because it is one-onone and when I make mistakes, it is not in front of the whole class, and I don't get embarrassed." (Hannah C., 4th grade)
- "Online tutoring helped me a lot. I started the year not knowing any Hebrew. It was easy to get on Zoom meetings. I was excited to learn how to read within few months!" (Ramona G, 6th grade)

As the Community Religious school is embarking on its second year, new initiatives such as expanding the Hebrew one-on-one to 1st and 2nd graders and new curriculum intensives for 6th and 7th graders are going to be implemented. Since we are not limited by social distancing this year, we are excited to be planning various social opportunities for our students and their families such as apple picking, Havdalah, and Friday night dinners. CRS is further collaborating with LiNK and the JCC to enhance programming for all ages.

Opening day for the school year is September 11. A drone will be capturing the parents, holding Talitot, as their children begin the new year. All parents are invited to a Zoom parent orientation on September 15 at 7:30 pm. Ganainu will meet on September 18, and the whole community is encouraged to join us at apple picking on September 25. 716 Outdoor Dinner & Havdalah

Todah rabah (many thanks) to everyone who helped make our 716 Havdalah Service a success. More than 70 people shared a beautiful summer evening outdoors at the Broder Center. Many brought their own picnic dinner and had a chance to catch up with old friends and meet new people. Following dinner, we had delicious homemade desserts that included a variety of cookies and brownies. Next, Rabbi Gutmann led an inspiring Havdalah ceremony with prayer and music to end Shabbat. Havdalah is a Hebrew word that means separation and the service separates the end of Shabbat from the start of the new week. Our service included wine to symbolize the joy of Shabbat. Each person had their own aromatic spice sachet full of cinnamon and other sweet smelling spices to symbolize the lingering scent of the sweetness of Shabbat. A multi-wicked, braided candle was lit to symbolize the many different types of Jews in the world woven together in unity, strength and love. The candlelight, wine and sweet smelling spices all come together to help us carry Shabbat through the week until the next Shabbat. At the end of the service, the candle was extinguished into the wine, as a way to say goodbye to Shabbat. Rabbi Gutmann introduced each segment of the Havdalah service with a niggun (wordless melody) and a meditation on the 36 Tzadikim (righteous ones) who help to sustain and repair the world.
