Letter from the President

As I reflect on my childhood and growing up at TBZ, I rarely attended Shabbat services but loved Sunday School (and Monday Night School – remember that?). Going to services on a Friday night or Saturday morning was an "I have to" event but seeing my friends on Sunday no doubt fell under an "I get to" in my youth.

I'm not quite sure the first time that I heard about the mindset change from "I have to" vs. "I get to" but it has always been a fascinating concept to me. According to Thrive Global, this change in mindset and moving from the burden of obligation to the joy of freedom of opportunity in one simple change of a word helps to "reframe it and remind you that there is potential benefit in every situation." It also shifts things from potential negativity into a positive angle.

As I think about my time on the Bimah during High Holy Days, I realized how critical this new perspective of obligation vs. opportunity is as a leader. Looking out at our member's faces, I could sense an overwhelming spirit of gratitude for the opportunity of being together, for sitting together, and for praying together in our spiritual home at 805 Delaware. For many, it was the first High Holy Days spent in our building in three years. The impression I got was that people were not saying "I have to go to services," but rather, with our new rabbi and wonderful guest cantor, most were savoring the "I get to go to services" mindset. It was a remarkable feeling for me, and both Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur were filled with meaningful prayers, songs, sermons, and a spirit of new beginnings.

So I'm making a simple request: Try saying "I get to" more often. "I get to go to my kid's chorus concert," "I get to attend the training at work," "I get to go to my committee meeting," or "I get to go to services at TBZ." The transition from obligation to joy may take some time, but you will find that a little positively goes a long way.

In fact, an article from HuffPost says, "research has shown that there are benefits to being optimistic, from better physical and mental health to longer, more satisfying relationships." Isn't that what this new year of 5783 should be all about?

I hope you join me in the coming months as "I get to" attend various committee meetings and services at TBZ. And during this Thanksgiving season of gratitude, I "get to" wish a joyous, happy and restful Thanksgiving to all our TBZ family. It feels good to be back together again.

Letter from the Rabbi

DO IT!

A large black tent sign sat on my Grandpa's desk emblazoned in white with the words "DO IT!" Family lore claims that Nike executives, who regularly met with my Grandpa Max Gutmann, dreamed up the iconic trademark "Just do it!" after meeting with him one day. The very first thing I bought when I started moving into Temple Beth Zion last July was my very own black tent stand with those same words.

My Grandpa Max was the President and CEO of Elder-Beerman department store for 35 years. He led a remarkable life. He grew up in Neiderwerrn, Germany. When he was sixteen years old, just after the Kryastallnacht pogrom, the Night of Broken Glass, he fled with his parents to Shanghai, China. Two years later, they secured American visas and arrived destitute in Cincinnati, Ohio. And not long after that, he was enlisted to US Army intelligence. I never knew him back then. I only knew him as an accomplished businessman. Full of determination, tough as nails, and adored by his employees. If Max Gutmann said, "DO IT!" you did it.

There are moments in life that call upon us to 'do it.' We may feel tired or struggle for hope. We may not even understand why, but we just have to do it. This month on the Hebrew calendar is nicknamed *Mar Cheshvan* or Bitter Cheshvan—bitter because we just completed Tishrei, which contains both the majestic High Holy Days and its joyous festivals of Sukkot & Shemini Atezeret-Simchat Torah. We enter Cheshvan with a feeling of "back to the grind". School is well under way yet the new chapter we began together in July is not complete. We must continue.

"Na'aseh ve-nishma" - We will do and then we will understand. (Exodus 24:7) This is the famous statement made upon accepting the Torah by our people at the foot of Mount Sinai. In Judaism, far more important than our beliefs and understanding, are our actions. Our actions come first. We understand ourselves through our doing. As such, Mitzvot, commandments, the rules governing our rituals as well as those defining the nature of our communal governance and our interpersonal interactions take precedence.

Back in July, I shared my thoughts with our Board that this lens was especially useful to us at this moment in the life of our congregation. I told them "This is our Nike moment, when we need to 'Just do it!'" Now, after the High

In this season of reflection and new beginnings, I'd like to continue a tradition of recounting a number of TBZ's successes from the preceding year. They are presented below in no particular order. Some are smaller and some are larger, but together they exemplify the work we are doing to grow and strengthen our temple community:

- Completed a successful search for a new Senior Rabbi. Rabbi Brent Gutmann has brought energy and passion as our spiritual leader, and the outpouring of support from our congregation has been overwhelming. Our amazing Transition Committee facilitated more than a dozen Meet & Greet events for the congregation and community to get to know Rabbi Gutmann and his family. They've also coordinated several special services and events like our Havdalah service on July 4 and the Erev Shabbat service on August 19 during which we also celebrated Rabbi Gutmann's birthday.
- Returned to in-person Shabbat morning services, "in the round" and featuring a variety of talented soloists.
- Collected \$10,000 and hundreds of items to assist refugee families in settling into new apartments in Buffalo.
- Raised thousands of dollars in support of people struggling in Ukraine.
- Raised hundreds of dollars and accepted donations for the Community Fridge organization, serving people living near the TOPS on Jefferson Ave.
- Surpassed our first-year goal of 18 commitments to the Grinspoon Foundation's Life and Legacy Program and, by doing so, earned a \$5,000 incentive bonus from the Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies and the Buffalo Jewish Federation.
- Our "second draw" \$191,000 PPP loan was fully forgiven.
- Received \$83,000 for the 2020 Employee Retention Credit and applied for an additional \$180,000 for 2021.
- Hosted another hugely successful Summer Celebration.
- Earned nearly \$4,000 from parking cars during the Allentown Art Festival.
- Welcomed again Cantor Ted Labow as our guest cantor High Holy Day services and the surrounding Shabbat services.
- Candlelight Productions, led by TBZ congregant Rob Rothkopf, delivered an incredibly high-quality remote experience for those who wished to worship from home during Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

- Confirmed we will be receiving at least \$150,000 to increase the security of our building downtown, with the possibility of another \$150,000 on the way.
- Painted the walls and installed new carpet in the hallway at 805.
- Logged and relocated all items from our Cofeld museum and are poised to present them in new and meaningful ways.
- Created a Director of Member Experience position on the staff to help support congregants through the administrative processes associated with major life events at the synagogue.
- Hired additional security for every service and event.
- Continued convening our Covid Task Force and adjusting Temple policies based on recommended guidelines and local Covid rates.
- Participated in coordinating the Buffalo Jewish Federation's Belonging Conference.
- Cleared out and professionally cleaned the basement at Broder, creating a nice storage area for Buffalo Hearing and Speech.
- Converted a storage area at 805 Delaware to serve as Dr. Chana Kotzin's office for curation of the Cofeld Museum.
- Installed a new HVAC system and storm windows for Jewish Family Services. We also replaced flooring in the stairwells, rebuilt the wing-walls and poured a new concrete entrance platform.
- Opened our new ladies' room where the men's coat room used to be.
- Celebrated multiple B'nai Mitzvah, weddings, Confirmation, and other events in person in our sanctuary for the first time since Covid began. Everyone agrees it feels spectacular to be home.
- The exterior of the sanctuary was power-washed along with the entire front concourse area.
- Threw a tremendous community S'lichot celebration in partnership with Congregation Shir Shalom, featuring "Chocolate and Chamber Music" followed by a beautiful service in our sanctuary.
- Our Caring Community resumed the packing and delivery of Rosh Hashanah gift bags to those in our community who may most appreciate them.
- The Golden Garden was beautifully manicured and a broken irrigation system was replaced.

We have much to be grateful for and much to be proud of. THANK YOU to the entire congregation for the contributions of your time, skills, funds, and passion that keep it all running. We're doing great things together and only getting better.

Free Baking Demonstrations

Thursday, November 10, 6 p.m. Whole Foods, 3139 Sheridan Drive, Amherst

Join TBZ member and baker extraordinaire, Errol Sull, for the first of a series of monthly baking demonstrations at Whole Foods. Errol will kick off the series with carrot cake (nicknamed Bugs Bunny!). It is one of the most requested recipes he's



created and he has never given it out...until November 10.

The demonstration will begin with Errol's Fun Food Facts, followed by preparation of the filling and frosting, and insights into the "how" of the baking, including such little-known items as why eggs should be at room temp, how to soften butter quickly, the difference between baking soda and baking powder, and others.

Once the cakes are decorated, samples will be offered along with the printed recipe.

There is no charge for the demonstrations and registration is not required - just go!

(What's Happening at CRS)

While October was an exciting month at CRS, with continued increased enrollment, November is shaping up to be just as exciting!! The students are starting a more regular schedule, with the *Chagim* passing us, and the learning and engagement is in full force.

Our 1-on-1 tutors for 124 children have been meeting and teaching our students remotely. It is wonderful to see parents join their children at Zoom meetings to learn Hebrew alongside their children, thus setting an example, reinforcing skills, and engaging in Jewish learning as a family. This endeavor is made possible by community donors and in part by a grant from Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies and the Buffalo Jewish Federation.

Tikkun Olan is an important component throughout the school. Better Together has been an important part of the middle school curriculum. In this program, students participate in various learning and inter-generational activities with seniors. The grades 5, 6 and 7 students wrote letters to the seniors, made succah decorations and some went together to see the play *The Chosen* at the JRT. A special in-person brunch for the seniors and teens will take place on November 13. In addition, on October 9, all CRS families were invited to participate in TBT's Outstretched Arm Succot program for adult Jews with disabilities. "If I am only for myself-what am I", our students demonstrated compassion and the true essence of K'lal Israel.

Another wonderful aspect of CRS has been Parent-Council. The parents involved have been selling snacks to the students, and meeting to learn together while their children are learning down-the-hall! Seeing the parents just re-affirmed that we are truly a community of learners!

The Madrichim, our 26 grades 8th-12th students are setting a wonderful example for the younger children. We are also excited that six of them are participating in advanced Jewish studies courses through Brandeis University Better 2 Learn Program and will be travelling to Boston for a 4-day study intensive in December. Yishar Koach!

It is truly an honor to be a part of this amazing and successful community collaboration!


Honorable Menschen





Holy Days, this theme continues in certain ways while we remain in transition, but we gradually begin the shift to "nishma"—into trying to better understand the needs of our community. We slowly begin deconstructing the processes of our congregation so that we can begin reconstructing them to better serve our needs. We begin to ask more, "Who are we and what do we want to be in this new chapter?"

My first four months with you have been remarkable. We have done so much and that has helped us to begin reclaiming our optimistism about where we are heading. Certainly, your commitment to Temple Beth Zion still remains necessary to secure the best possible scenario for our future. Our world has changed and we need to reconsider how we serve our members and community, but we are on a good path and, if we continue to do the things we are doing while starting to ask questions and making incremental changes, we will get there.

Twenty years ago, my Grandpa Max agreed to show me and my younger sister where he grew up in Germany. As we arrived in Neiderwerrn, he described how difficult life was as a Jew in Nazi Germany. I asked him, "How did you find the motivation to keep going?" and he responded without hesitation, "I wanted to show them what a Jew could do." The comment struck me powerfully.

I believe that we were created for a purpose. God, the Source of Life, the Eternal, whatever we wish to call the divine, guides us.
