Letter from the Rabbi

Chanukah In Hopeful Dedication

The rabbis teach we kindle lights on Chanukah to remind ourselves of the miracle of the oil that occurred in the year 166 BCE. The story is of Judah Hasmonaeans, known better by his nickname Judah Maccabee. He successfully recaptured the Temple in Jerusalem from the Seleucid King, Antiochus IV. The Jews set about cleaning and purifying the defiled Temple, but they soon realized they lacked enough oil. They did not have enough to sustain the menorah's lamps until more could be processed. Nevertheless, a great miracle happened. The oil lasted for eight nights and the lamps burned continually!

Chanukah, which means 'dedication,' always coincides with the new moon closest to the winter solstice on the Hebrew calendar. Therefore, those who observe Chanukah are literally shining lights in darkness. It is a memory of the Maccabees hard-won freedom of religious practice in their own time. So too, may the Chanukah candles inspire us that whenever we feel ourselves groping in the darkness, we can dedicate ourselves anew towards making our world worthy of God's presence, and that God will help us in our endeavors.

As we approach Chanukah this year, we are in the middle of an exciting period of renewal for Temple Beth Zion. Already for five months we have been working together to reposition Temple to serve our community's needs. We have resumed occasional Young Family Shabbat (on 3rd Fridays of each month) and worship services at the Broder Center (4th Fridays – speaking of which, **be sure to join us on Friday, December 23rd for Lights and Latkes** — our Temple's Chanukah Celebration at the Broder Center featuring dinner, games, and a special musical service). Our leadership, staff, members, and friends are healing and joining hands, we are tackling the work of restoring our historic Delaware building, improving our online presence, and positioning ourselves to serve you and your families for into the unforeseeable future.

Each step is being executed intentionally and methodically as we realign and steer our Temple to health. We believe our faith is more important than ever these days to shine light into a difficult world. We are concerned about our security. We are concerned about anti-Semitism and the persistence of hatred. We are concerned about the social fabric of America and the social fabric of the Jewish State of Israel. We are concerned about global stagnation, international conflict, and intensifying climate disasters.

We are concerned about each other and our mutual redemption, but there will always be light in the darkness so long as we remain dedicated.

Our responsibility as Jews is to build a world worthy of God's presence. As we reposition our Temple to serve 21st century Jewish needs, we embrace this struggle for redemption anew. With your support, we, our families, our Temple community, and our Western New York Jewish community can still bring light to the nations. We can celebrate ethnic and religious diversity. We can bring an end to hatred and violence. We can repair our world. And should our hope waver, let us rededicate ourselves to hope. In the words of the prophet Zacharia, "not by might, not by power, but by spirit alone." (*Zach. 4:6*)

Chanukah Blessings



Candles are added to the hanukkiyah (menorah) from right to left but are kindled from left to right. The newest candle is lit first. On Shabbat during Chanukah, the hanukkiyah candles are lit before Shabbat candles.

Light the shamash (the helper candle) first, using it to kindle the rest of the Chanukah lights.

As you do, say or sing:

Baruch Ata, Adonai Eloheinu, melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitsvotav v'tsivanu l'hadik ner shel Chanukah.

Blessed are you Adonai, our God, Sovereign of all, who hallows us with mitzvot, and commands us to kindle the Chanukah lights.

Baruch Ata, Adonai Eloheinu, melech haolam, she-asa nisim lavoteinu bayamim haheim bazman hazeh.

Blessed are you Adonai, our God, Sovereign of all, who performed wonderous deeds for our ancestors in days of old at this season.

For first night only:

Baruch Ata, Adonai Eloheinu, melech haolam, she-hechiyanu v'kiyimanu v'higiyanu lazman hazeh.

Blessed are you Adonai, our God, Sovereign of all, who has kept us alive, sustained us, and brought us to this season.

Hanerot Halalu

We kindle these lights because of the wondrous deliverance You performed for our ancestors. During these eight days of Chanukah, these lights are sacred; we are not to use them but only to behold them, so that their glow may rouse us to give thanks for Your wondrous acts of deliverance.



The students had an opportunity to exchange stories of growing up and learned from the seniors how they experienced antisemitism in their life and how they handled it. The Madrichim, our 26 students in grades 8-12 continue setting a wonderful example to the younger children. The Legend of Latkes

Did the Macabees really fuel their fight with latkes? While Brent was in Rabbinical School at Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati, I was in graduate school there studying Jewish Ethics. Brent and I took a class in Modern Jewish History with Dr. Michael Meyer. For a term paper, I decided I would research a Jewish food and trace the history of Cholent (Sabbath Stew). In doing the research for this paper, I learned a few shocking things about the potato pancake. They could never have been eaten by our ancestors. Why? Well, there were no potatoes in ancient Israel. They weren't even introduced to Europe until the sixteenth century after they were brought and cultivated in Europe from South America. And as for olive oil, there was not such a thing in the Ashkenazi lands that many of our ancestors inhabited. There is no way you could grow olives in Russia or Poland. So what would they fry in? Schmaltz of course! As for potatoes, more likely our ancestors probably made a pancake out of barley or rye, which was a common winter grain in Eastern Europe. The idea of eating a pancake itself only dates to the Jews of Italy beginning in the 1300's made out of ricotta cheese and grain. It was a Jewish cookbook in 1958 called the Art of Jewish Cooking that really codified the idea of Jews eating potato pancakes with the description "The wives of the soldiers of the ancient hero Judah Maccabee hurriedly cooked for their men behind the lines." The legend might be wrong, but the taste and the tradition of eating fried pancakes for Chanukah has become a tradition, maybe only a recent one, but a tradition nonetheless. To honor our ancestors who came from Eastern Europe, we have tried to add shmaltz to our recipe every year. We have been creative with the different options of schmaltz, although duck fat is definitely the preference in the Gutmann household. This can be harvested by roasting a duck, which makes an amazing main course to your latkes. You can also buy prepared duck fat at most groceries if you want to add a little additional flavor to your oil.

Gutmann Schmaltzy Potato Latkes

(adapted from Tina Wasserman's Entree to Judaism)

6-8 large thin skinned potatoes

3 eggs, beaten well

1 Tablespoon salt

1/2 teaspoon freshly ground pepper

1/2-cup matzo meal

1 large onion, cut into 8 pieces

Duck fat or other shmaltz you prefer and oil for frying (vegetable oil works better than olive as it has a higher smoke point). If using olive oil, make sure not to get extra virgin. Regular olive oil fries better.

- 1. Grate the raw potatoes using the large grating disk on a processor or the largest holes on a grater if doing it by hand. Place grated potato in a colander, rinse with cold water and drain while you grate onion. It is important to get as much water as possible out of potatoes to get a crisper latke.
- 2. Combine eggs, salt, pepper and matzo meal in a 3 quart bowl. Mix thoroughly.
- 3. Change to the cutting blade on your processor. Add onions to the work bowl. Pulse on and off 5 times. Add ¼ of the grated potatoes to the onion and pulse on and off to make a coarse paste. Add to the egg mixture and stir to combine.
- 4. Add the drained potatoes to the bowl and mix thoroughly using a large spoon or your hands.
- 5. Heat a large frying pan or large skillet for 20 seconds. (We like to use an electric frying pan to 350 degrees as it is easier to regulate the frying oil.) Add enough oil/shmaltz to cover the pan to a depth of 1/4 inch and heat for an additional 20 seconds. (We add all the shmaltz we have and use oil to supplement.) Drop mounds of potato mixture into the pan. Fry on both sides until golden. Drain fried latkes on a platter covered with crumpled paper towels. I keep them warm in the oven at 250 degrees while I continue to fry. This way they are all warm when it is time to eat them.

If you have extras, freeze and reheat at 425 degrees for 20 minutes. They reheat really well if they are frozen. They are super soggy if stored in the refrigerator.





What is an Oneg?

"Oneg" means "delight," and according to the Prophet Isaiah, "Shabbat shall be a delight." During times when food was often scarce, having something sweet to nosh on became the "delight of Shabbat". That is where our tradition of having a Friday evening Oneg Shabbat comes from. Lingering, talking, and eating sweets after the service adds to the feeling of a delightful Shabbat being different from other days of the week, when we often must rush from place to place.
