Letter from the Rabbi

Planting for our Children

On February 5, we will be observing Tu BiSh'vat, the "New Year of the Trees" with a tour of the Buffalo & Erie County Botanical Gardens. Following the tour we will hold a Seder focused on environmental sustainability (see information on back cover). Although a minor Jewish festival, this day has taken on additional meaning in the contemporary context of extreme weather. Our city recently experienced two major snow events with some areas receiving more than six feet, followed by an unseasonably warm January. By several measures, the Christmas/end of Hanukkah surpassed the severity of the Blizzard of 1977. Around the world and across the country, record weather events continue to occur. As they do, our confidence in linking human activity with climate change grows.

These phenomena are not the responsibility of any one individual or any one group of people, but rather, we are all responsible, and as we consider this responsibility, foreboding words of Torah reverberate, that if we do not change our behavior, "The Eternal's anger will flare up against you, shutting up the skies so that there will be no rain and the ground will not yield its produce; and you will soon perish from the good land that God is assigning to you." (Deut. 11:17)

While we have crossed the tipping point regarding avoiding some of the consequences of climate change, there is still an opportunity to avoid the worst outcomes with collective action: we can work towards reducing our consumption of fossil fuels as we switch to more renewable resources, we can build resiliency among populations which are vulnerable to climate change, and we can learn and build community to resolve conflicts that distract us from this existential threat.

Around these issues, our faith encourages responsibility and concern for others. Among human beings, the first charges in creation are to be guardians of the earth A famous story in the Talmud tells of the unusual character Honi encountering an elderly man planting a carob tree. Honi incredulously informs the man that carob trees take seventy years to produce fruit, yet the man responds, "Just as my ancestors planted for me, I too am planting for my children."

We continue to work in partnership with Scott F. Propeack, the associate director and chief curator of the Burchfield Penney Art Center, in order to professionally curate our art collection, now part of the museum holdings. Our museum committee, headed by Susan Adelman and Larry Rubin, has signed with an experienced fabricator for the new museum installation. Celebrating Purim

This success truly proves that WE ARE BACK as a congregation.



What Can ShulCloud Do for Me?

As a TBZ congregant, you have probably seen or heard the term "ShulCloud", but you may not have any idea of what it is, how it works, or what it can do for you. Members of TBZ, please read on!



ShulCloud is a cloud-based synagogue management software used by several hundred synagogues throughout the United States. It was designed to serve the unique needs of congregations and their members, from financials to communications to data management and much more.

While ShulCloud helps a lot behind the scenes, it can help you, too! Streamline your membership experience at TBZ by using ShulCloud to make donations, register and pay for events, track your family's yahrzeits, manage your dues payments, connect with others at TBZ and more.

As a member of TBZ you already have a ShulCloud account, but you need to be able to access your account in order to take advantage of it. Here's how!

Step 1: THE "FRONT DOOR": On your computer, laptop, tablet, or mobile phone, navigate to https://templebethzionbuffalo.shulcloud.com/. I like to think of this page as the "front door" to your Shulcloud experience.

Step 2: EMAIL & PASSWORD: Click on the tiny "Login" at the top right. If an email and password are pre-filled, click on "Sign In". If that was the correct combination of email and password, the "Login" box will now say "Welcome [Your Name]". Click there and then on "My Account" and you'll be taken to your member account area.

If the email and password don't prefill, or you can't recall the correct combination, you can try using the "Forgot Password" or "Sign in with Google" options and then continue as described above.

If none of these attempts work, email me, beth@tbz.org, and request a new login link. Include your full name and the email address you prefer for TBZ/ShulCloud. I will direct ShulCloud to email you with a new login link as soon as I can. Watch for the email from ShulCloud, choose your new password, and repeat Step 2.

<u>Step 3: MEMBER ACCOUNT PAGE:</u> Once you successfully login and arrive at your Member Account page, look around at all the options it offers!

My Personal and Family Information allows you to view and edit your profile, your family info, your mailing address, etc.
